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CATHOLICS SUPPORT NEAR EAST SALVAGE CAMPAIGN

Cooperation of the Catholic clergy and laity is one of the pillars of Near East Relief Campaign to help save the thousands of hungry, suffering women and homeless orphans in Armenia and Syria which started throughout the state of Illinois on March 1. Prominent prelates of the Catholic church, including such men as Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop Shaw of New Orleans, Bishop Muldoon of Rockford, Ill., members of the laity like George Walter Smith of Philadelphia, and Col. Wm. N. Haskell, high commissioner for the Allied Powers in the Caucasus, have made stirring appeals to the members of the Catholic church to heed the hunger cry of the starving babies and women of the Near East and do everything in their power, both in service and money, for this great task of human salvage, which, they point out, is the duty of every human American to assist, irrespective of their religion.

Among the prominent churchmen of Illinois who are active in the Near East Relief campaign is the Rev. J. H. Whelan, of St. Mary's church, Rockford, who was elected vice-chairman of the Illinois state committee for the Near East Relief at the recent state conference held in Springfield.

On the staff of Col. Haskell, who is the Near East representative in the Caucasus, are many Catholics, including the following: Col. John Dely, chief of staff; Col. T. C. Tomrigan, Col. C. Clio, Col. Parker C. Kalloch, Col. M. Shelly, Major Patrick McSweeney, Col. F. E. McCammon, Major T. McDonald, Major F. Dyer, Captain R. Kinney and Capt. George F. Riley.

Special appeals from many noted bishops have been sent out to their people and the public generally urging them to assist in this work of human salvage, pointing out the terrible suffering of the people in the Near East and citing the fact that these destitute women and children have only one hope of help in their suffering and that is what comes from America.

Following are statements from prominent Catholic churchmen concerning the Near East Relief:

Cardinal Gibbons: "The appalling tales of massacre and famine appeal to humanity and so I cannot urge too strongly the duty of immediate relief. It is a duty that rests upon every Christian people and our own country cannot fail to recognize and heed it. There can be no doubt of the response of every American, no matter what his religion."

Bishop John J. Cantwell of Los Angeles: "Our people will not ask to what religion the Armenians and Syrians belong. It will be enough for them to know that there is want, destitution and suffering in the Near East."

Bishop Edmund F. Gibbons of Albany, N. Y.: "You are engaged in a work of genuine charity, which, I trust, will appeal to the consciences and secure the cooperation of thousands of our fellow citizens and I earnestly pray that they will be blessed and rewarded by our all merciful Father."

Bishop William Turner of Buffalo, N. Y.: "The drive for the Near East Relief fund has my hearty approval. The need of this suffering people is very great. The appeal to our generosity and charity is a powerful one and I hope that the Catholics will do their part nobly in responding according to their means."

Bishop Paul Rhode of Green Bay, Wis.: "It seems that of all the nations which have suffered in consequence of the European war Armenia affords the most sorrowful spectacle. An entire people has undergone a most cruel and heart-rending martyrdom. The sad lot of its thousands of starving and homeless children should especially enlist our sympathy and help. Could we but realize amid the comforts we enjoy what must be the miserable fate of these little ones, the work of the Near East Relief would meet with every support. I certainly commend it and wish it success."

Bishop Peter James Muldoon, of Rockford, Ill.: "If my cooperation will help you in solving the problems of the destitute people of the Near East, you should know you already have it in the fullest measure."

Archbishop Edward J. Hanna, of San Francisco, Cal.: "This is an occasion where the lines of creed must be abolished and all Americans having hearts in sympathy with distressed meet on the plane of Christian fellowship, giving of their substance according to their individual means. It is of particular interest to us that the administrative affairs of Near East in Western Asia are in the hands of Col. Haskell, himself a Roman Catholic and a man of sterling character. It is of particular interest to us that the chief aim of this organization is to give renewed life to fellow Christians."

Col. William N. Haskell, high commissioner for the Allied Powers in

the Caucasus, and representative for the Near East Relief in that section, himself a prominent Catholic, said in a recent cablegram: "Armenia could not exist one week if our assistance were withdrawn. Its salvation rests on our ability to keep our organization operating and line of communications open for supplies to reach the sufferers, which depends on our ability to overcome most difficult political and economic situations."
