The books show that her tax this year is \$76,063.21, which is so far in excess of the personal tax paid by any other individual in Lake county that there is no comparison.

Federal woman suffrage was ratified by the 31st state the other day. The chances that women will vote everywhere at the fall election for president are growing stronger. If so, here is a big job in the states that have not had woman suffrage, to educate the women to take up for the first time the responsibilities of the franchise.

The majority of women in non-suffrage states have not so far taken a deep interest in politics. This has been perfectly natural since they had no direct method of expressing their convictions.

Clubs and other organizations of women in the non-suffrage states should take up this matter at once. They should assemble just as many women as possible to consider the fundamental problems of citizenship, also the history of political parties and political methods. The effort should be made to interest every woman in her prospective new duties. Only in that way will they be able to vote intelligently.
