Convention Delegates
Mrs. W. A. Alexander and Mrs. Carl Pfanstiehl were elected at the last meeting of the Board of Directors as delegates to the National convention of the Young Women's Christian association, which will be held in Cleveland from April 13 to 20. Mrs. O. L. Oleson was elected an alternate.

Very important questions will come up before this convention which is ordinarily held once in two years, but which has not occurred since 1916, because of the war. One question which is of greatest importance for the student Associations is the changing of the basis of membership. Hitherto, in order to have a voting membership, or to hold office, a college student had to be a member of a Protestant Evangelical church. The new plan is not to require church membership, but to have each voting member take the following pledge:

"I promise to lead my life as a true follower of the Lord Jesus Christ."

This is an alternate basis of membership; that is, no student Association need adopt the plan unless it desires. It will make no change in the city and town Associations, in which voting members must still be members of churches affiliated in the Federal Council of Churches. Associate members in all Associations may belong to other churches than those designated, or may hold no church membership. They have all privileges given to Association members except the voting power.

Industrial questions which concern the vast body of working girls and women in the country will be brought before the convention, and many other great problems, such as that of the immigrant woman, will be brought up.

The Convention will bring a great deal of inspiration to all who are privileged to attend, for many of the most brilliant and consecrated women from all sections of the country will bring their best thought to the Convention.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 250 OF "HIGHLAND PARK CODE OF 1919," BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:

Section 1. That Section 250 of "Highland Park Code of 1919" be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

250. (Water Rates.)
11. The following water rates are hereby adopted:

Minimum rate where meters are not used:

Four-Month Period, ending August 1st\$1.35
Three-Month Period, ending November 1st 1.00
Five-Month Period, ending April 1st 1.65

Where water meters are used, a charge of 13½ cents per 100 cubic feet will be made for all water used up to 134,000 cubic feet per annum, less ten per cent (10%) discount for payment of bill within 15 days from date of same and nine cents net per 100 cubic feet for all water used in excess of 134,000 cubic feet per annum. In no case, however, shall the charge for any period be less than the minimum rate.

Special rates for water used for special purposes shall be fixed from time to time by the Council or such person as it may designate.

Section 2. The rates herein specified shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.


