and has not yet selected his assistants. That he has consented to act as director assures the community that the dances on Saturday nights at the high school will be not only well attended but that they will be wholesome, dignified and delightful in every way. Duffy's orchestra, our own Highland Park organization of musicians, furnishes the inspiring music for these 'hops,' and the small fee charged will be sufficient to make them self-sustaining and provide a small balance each week to be turned into the general fund for further development of community work. Three hundred and sixty-one totaled the attendance last Saturday night. Great enthusiasm and appreciation was expressed on all sides.

These dances promise to be the BIG feature of our Community Service and with constantly increasing crowds Mr. Brown needs the help of men to manage and of women to chaperone. Highland Park women will be rendering themselves a service by going to these affairs and knowing by direct contact the fine spirit of good fun and fellowship prevailing while encouraging and morally stabilizing the young people by their presence. In community activities of this kind there is great opportunity for young and 'less young' (never old in these modern days) to come together in mutual enjoyment and understanding. Parents as well as children should 'get the habit' of the Saturday night dance.

If there are those who have not received their membership buttons, Mr. Harris at the Center or Mrs. Grundy at the North Shore Trust bank will be glad to supply them.

With the patient co-operation of the public, Community Service of Highland Park will develop into a fine thing. The Board is at serious work with a serious purpose and while fully realizing handicaps in the way of adequate rooms, complete equipment, etc., still know that much can be done under present conditions to prove the idea worth while and necessary to our best civic interests.

THE BOARD OF REVIEW UNDER HEAVY FIRE

OBJECT TO 30% INCREASE

Tax Increase Throughout Lake County Not Uniform. Some Townships Harder Hit Than Others

The action taken August 29, 1919, by the Board of Review of Lake County in raising land values in the cities of Lake Forest, Highland Park and Waukegan uniformly 30 per cent above the values set by the local assessors has been questioned by certain taxpayers. Other townships were raised as follows: Avon, Lake Villa and Grant 30 per cent; Antioch, 25 per cent; Newport 20 per cent; Wauconda, Elia and Warren 15 per cent; Cuba and Vernon 10 per cent and Fremont 5 per cent. William Wright of Waukegan was granted a temporary injunction by Judge Welsh in the circuit court last Monday restraining the county treasurer from collecting the taxes on the increased valuation of the property of the complainant. The petition that secured the injunction recited that the Board of Review had taken the action complained of without due process of law. The law requires that when a horizontal raise is contemplated, notices to that effect must be sent out to at least fifty taxpayers in the district affected. This having been done and sufficient time having been given for filing objections, the Board of Review may take action. It is charged that this formality was not observed. It is not charged that the Board could not legally have made the present raise in valuation or a greater one if it had seen fit, even after all possible protests had been made. It is simply maintained (on a technicality, of course) that notices were not served according to law and that the increased valuation is illegal. That Judge Welsh was impressed by this argument is shown by his restraining order. It remains to be seen whether the taxing bodies affected can show cause to have this injunction dissolved or whether, on the other hand, a blanket injunction can be secured restraining the county treasurer from collecting the taxes on the increased valuation of all taxpayers affected. If the latter should happen, it is evident that many public enterprises would be crippled. Take Elm Place school for example. Much publicity has lately been given to the inability of the Board of Education of District 107 to maintain the usual high standard of Elm Place school today on the income of three or four years ago.
