Portland cement concrete base laid on a three (3) inch limestone macadam foundation all in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefor.

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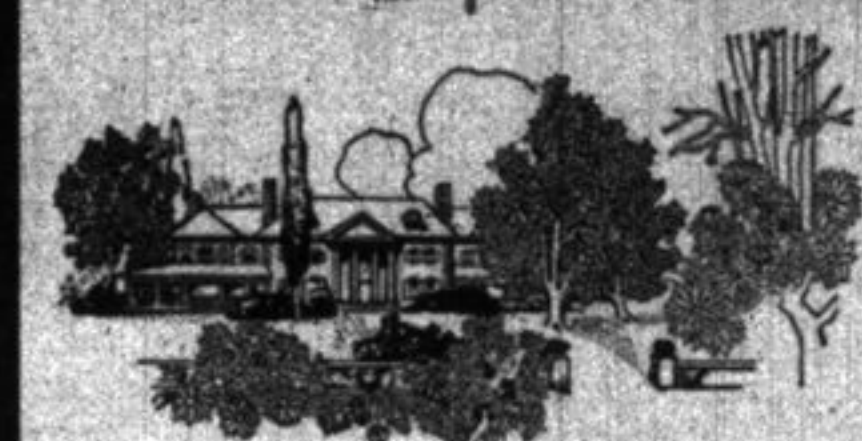
