abilities of the girls. Miss Louise McDonald has charge of the fifteen High School girls who form the glee club, which has provided entertainment at the various Association functions, and the orchestra is working faithfully and expects to be ready for service before very long.

Lectures for the girls are frequently given and Dr. Morrell who has given several talks on social health, has been one of the most popular speakers.

Parties for wounded soldiers from Fort Sheridan have been frequently given and these men have made up a large proportion of the 1928 persons who have attended the Association parties during the past year.

Another useful work conducted by the Association is the finding of employment for the women and girls who come to the rooms seeking work, and hundreds have been helped to places in the homes and stores of our community. Many relatives of men at Fort Sheridan have been helped to find rooms in which to stay.

In order to provide good food at a reasonable cost for the many who desire it, the Blue Triangle cafeteria and boarding home has been established with the aid of the War Work council of the Y. W. C. A. The local board was able to start this work last October and it has proved a great success. Four teachers have rooms in the house and many other teachers are regular patrons. Many aids and nurses from Fort Sheridan are attracted by the good food and home cooking, townspeople come in considerable numbers and the place is so crowded that there is urgent need of larger quarters to accommodate the regular guests.

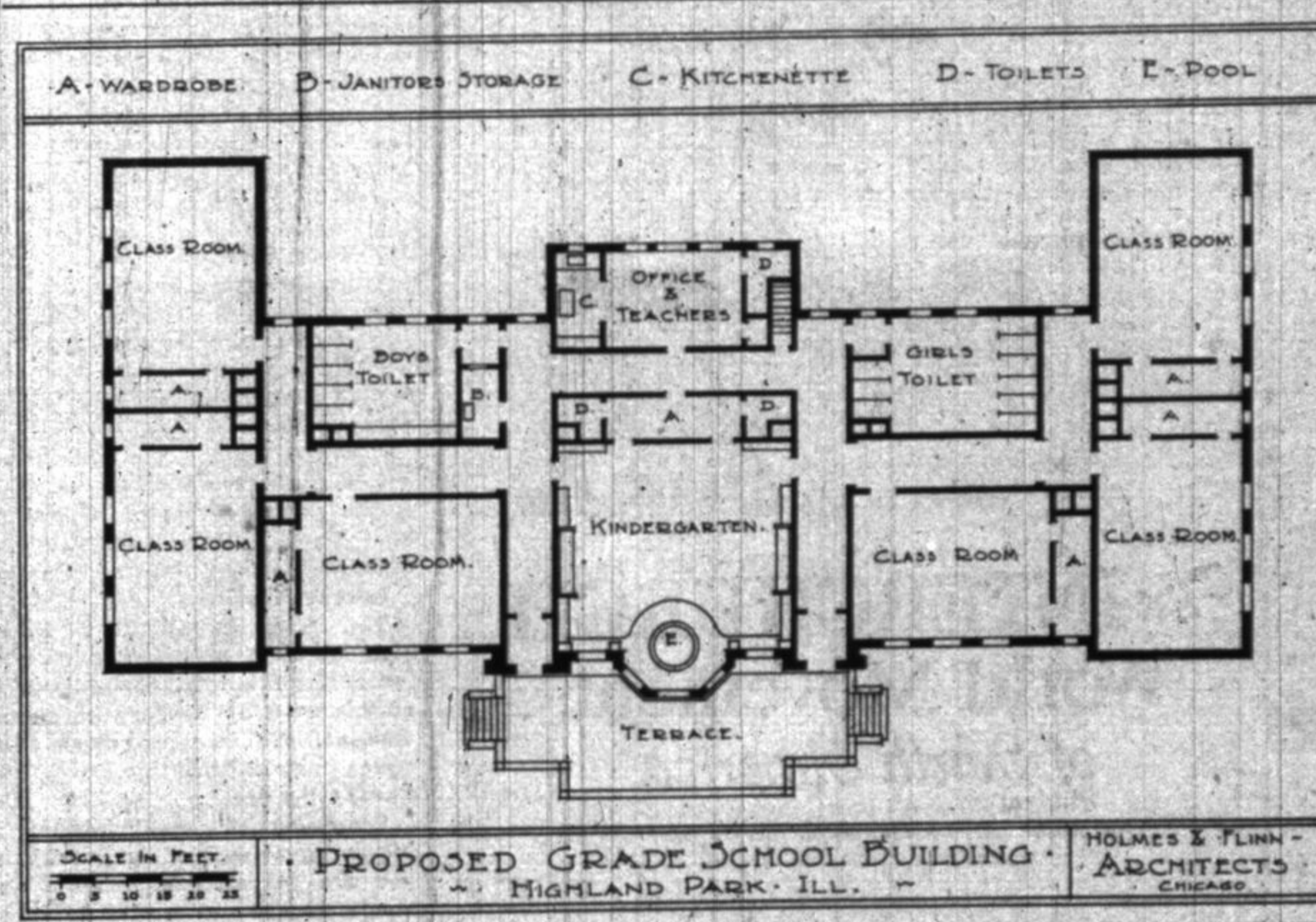

### COMPLETE PLANS FOR WORLD-WIDE CAMPAIGN

Final plans for the series of Inter-church World Movement conferences, which will be held in every county of Illinois between April 5 to 9, were completed in Chicago Monday afternoon. These county conferences will mark the beginning of an intensive campaign which will culminate with the eight day simultaneous financial campaign beginning April 25 for raising Illinois' quota of the \$336,777,572 for the general work of the churches participating in the Inter-

church Movement.

At the conference in Chicago Monday afternoon, Rev. R. Calvin Dobson, formerly pastor of the Highland Park Presbyterian church, gave final instructions to the leaders of the 25 teams of speakers who have volunteered their services for these county meetings. Each team will be made up of 5 members, and some of the best known church workers in Illinois, clergymen of the various denominations and many prominent members of the laity, men and women, will be included.
