Newspaper Press is Self-Made Institution, Having no Help from State or Philanthropy

The principal educational forces working in the modern community might be grouped under three heads: 1. The public schools. 2. The colleges, technical schools and academies. 3. The newspaper press.

Public schools represent the purpose of the entire state, and their success and efficiency are guaranteed by the taxing power of government. The colleges and other private schools represent humanitarian and cultural sentiment, with vast reserves of money to draw from.

The newspaper press is more of a self-made institution. It is an individualistic enterprise, with no help from state or philanthropy. It could be said to be the creation of a type of people having a certain temperament in common. The so-called love for "printers' ink" which holds them to their calling would seem to grow out of an exceptionally keen interest in human life and development and in civic and political progress.

The newspaper press started from small beginnings and has fought against great obstacles. Every successful newspaper has passed through its period of struggle, when it had to live on faith and hope, but not often on charity, because it rendered an equivalent.

The newspaper press has reached the point where many people feel it is a greater power than either public schools or colleges. Schools and colleges exercise a dominating influence for a few years. Then their influence upon the individual largely ceases, and they turn their attention to a new group. But the newspaper press exerts its influence from the day a child learns to read until the day he dies. Which is the greater force?

The community has no greater problem than the evolution of this mighty force up to its highest possibilities of service and leadership.

to be Spent?**



A businesslike Answer to a businesslike Question

THIRTY denominations cooperating in the Interchurch World Movement have budgeted their needs. No business could have done it more scientifically.

They have united to prevent the possibility of duplication or waste. At least a million dollars will be saved by the fact that thirty individual campaigns are joined in one united effort.

Each denomination has arranged its budget under six main heads:

1 FOR THE CHURCH'S WORK AT HOME. A score of items come under this head. Consider only one. Five and a half million people in the United States cannot even read and write the English language. Who is to carry forward this vast work of Americanization if the church does not?

2 FOR HOSPITALS AND HOMES. Every year thousands of men and women seriously ill are turned away from Church hospitals because of lack of room. The children's homes are compelled to turn away more children than they can receive.

3 FOR HIGHER EDUCATION. Of the 450,000 American students in institutions of higher grade, one-half are in institutions founded and supported by the Churches. Many of these institutions have had no great endowment campaigns, but their needs are just as pressing as the needs of larger schools; and you have only to read the list of abandoned alumnæ to measure the value of their contribution to America.

4 FOR RELIGIOUS TRAINING. At least 12,000,000 children and young people under 25 years of age are entering American life without any religious training at all. Remembering the faith of Washington and Lincoln, do you think that America will continue to produce Washingtons and Lincolns if faith dies out of the hearts of its youth?

5 FOR THE CHURCH'S WORK ABROAD. Influenza came first from the Orient thirty years ago; nearly all plagues are Oriental plagues. So long as China has only one physician to every 400,000 people, the Orient will continue to be a menace. So long as one-third of the babies of India die before their second year our own babies are not safe. A Christian doctor or teacher sent abroad is working for America as truly as though he worked at home.

6 PREACHERS SALARIES. The preacher is called the "forgotten man," and well he may be. Eight out of ten preachers are paid less than \$20 a week!

Each denomination has its own detailed budget, and will administer its own funds. Your pastor has copies of the budget; examine them for yourself.
