GOV. LOWDEN FIRST IN LAKE COUNTY PRIMARY

Receives 3548 Votes in Total Count; Wood is Second With 2003 Votes

Official election returns, canvass of which has been completed by County Clerk Lew A. Hendee and his assistants, Harry Hoyt and Emil Ficke, shows the total county vote given Lowden for president as 3548, Wood 2003 and Johnson 616. On the Democratic ticket, Gov. E. J. Edwards received the highest number of votes, 36 ballots being cast for him in this county. McAdoo being second with 25.

ROAD OFFICIALS MAKE THEIR ANNUAL REPORT

dirt roads in the county, as follows: Antioch 1; Avon 8; Benton 3; Cuba 2; Ela 20; Grant 4; Lake Villa 64; Libertyville 4; Newport 23; Vernon 9; Wauconda 4.

There are 196 miles of improved dirt roads in the county as follows: Antioch 22, Avon 14, Benton 10, Cuba 8; Deerfield 11; Ela 25; Fremont 52; Grant 12; Lake Villa 8; Libertyville 14; Newport 23; Warren 5; Waukegan 8; Wauconda 5; West Deerfield 14.

There are 489 1/2 miles of gravel, rock, macadam or other hard roads in the county as follows: Antioch 27; Avon 14; Benton 10; Cuba 64; Deerfield 11; Ela 25; Fremont 26; Grant 19; Lake Villa 16 1/2; Libertyville 50; Newport 14; Shields 24; Vernon 59 1/2; Warren 40; Waukegan 15; Wauconda 41; West Deerfield 34.

There are 21 miles of State Aid roads already built in the county as follows: Avon 1 1/2; Benton 4 1/2; Lake Villa 4; Warren 3; Waukegan 8; Wauconda 1 1/2.

The total number of dirt roads of all kinds in the county is 272 1/2.

Plans are laid to build about 25 miles of State Aid roads this year in the following townships: Avon 1 1/2; Cuba 3; Lake Villa 3; Warren 2; Wauconda 1; West Deerfield 6; it is estimated that this work will cost between \$40,000 and \$45,000 a mile complete.

It is also estimated that about 56 miles of gravel, rock or macadam, mostly gravel roads, will be built this year in the several townships of the county at an estimated cost of about \$2,000 a mile complete.

Fremont township has the most miles of dirt roads of any township in the county, either improved or unimproved.

Shields is the only township in the county which has all of its roads hard surfaced.

Fremont township contains 78 miles of highways, being the greatest number of any township in the county.

Vernon township can boast of being the banner township of the county when it comes to gravel, rock, macadam or other hard roads, having 59 1/2 miles to her credit.

Benton township has the least number of miles of gravel, rock, macadam or other hard roads of any township in the county, having only 10 miles of them within its boundary.

The township of East Deerfield has the least mileage of all kinds of roads in the county, having only 1 1/2 miles outside of its incorporated cities.

posed alternate basis of membership for student associations; endorsement of the Social Creed of the churches, including standards for industrial girls; and the future plan of financing the association in its national, and international program for young women. In all these matters the convention proved itself to be liberal in the best sense of that much abused word. The student amendment passed with a large majority, making it possible, from now on, for a student association to admit girls to full membership upon their declaration.

"It is my purpose to live my life as a true follower of the Lord Jesus Christ." Before this membership has always been on the basis of membership in a church entitled to representation in the Federal Council of Churches of Christ.

The students themselves were their own best advocates. They came from all over the country to ask that this new basis be granted, since they felt that with it they could win larger numbers of girls to conscious Christian living, and hence to membership in a church. The fundamental question at stake was whether the church should be the gateway to the association or the association the gateway to the church. The students felt, and a large majority of the other delegates agreed with them, that thru the first of these two ways the association could best prove itself a true daughter of the church; that by including students within the association, the opportunity was greatest for unlisting them as Christians who recognized their relationship to the great Church of Christ. Two-thirds of the Cabinet (which consists of the chairmen of all committees and the officers) and of the Advisory board (which consists of the older women) must always be members of churches entitled to representation in the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ.

HOW MANY RIDES DID YOU HAVE?

Last year there were on an average 135 street car rides taken by every man, woman and child in the larger cities of the United States. Ten years ago the average in the same cities was little more than 108 rides for every person. During that time, according to figures compiled by Stone and Webster of Boston, the population of the cities in question increased 42.2 per cent, and the business of the traction companies increased 77 per cent, indicating that the street car is today "the people's vehicle" more than ever before.

Increased fares and further economy in operation have to some extent relieved the conditions that were described as acute less than a year ago, but keenest interest attaches to the report of the Federal Electric Railway Commission, which is expected soon. In many quarters this increase is ascribed to a large extent to information obtained at the hearings in Washington last Fall and given wide publicity.
