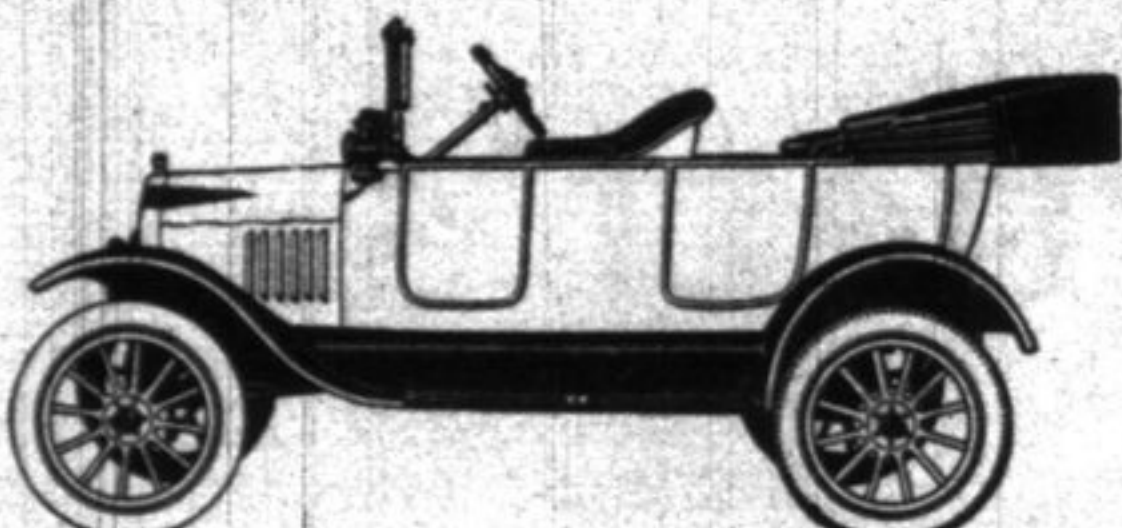

The Deerfield track team scored an overwhelming victory over La Grange Saturday afternoon at Highland Park, defeating them by a score of 81 to 41. Kimball's stellar performance in the track and field events was the feature of the afternoon. The local star entered ten of the fourteen events, won the 100 and 200 yd. dashes, high hurdles, broad jump, high jump and javelin throw. He took second place in the low hurdles and shot put and third place in the pole vault, besides running as anchor man on the winning relay team.

The only events in which La Grange was able to come to the front were the distance races and the pole vault. In the other events Deerfield took at least two and in several instances all three places.

THE COMMUNITY NEWSPAPER

The Rewards of the Profession

The financial troubles of the newspaper editor, particularly of the country editor, have long formed the subject of newspaper paraisage. The typical old time editor carried a heavy burden of debt, and struggled along as best he could with an out-worn plant. He distributed his free puffs of personal compliments with infinite good nature and friendliness and thought but little of money return. He never knew where he stood financially, and when the cupboard was bare, he went bill collecting.

Many editors who have swayed the opinion of state and nation did business in this irregular way. Innumerable others less conspicuous, did their best under great difficulties to render community service. But inability to modernize their plants, or to hire sufficient or adequate help, limited the quality of the service they were able to give.

Many large newspapers of national reputation have always paid their reporters but a pittance, and editors but little more. As a result there has been constant shifting of newspaper forces. Many young men try the business for a few years and quit. Then a new force of "cubs" has to be taken on and broken in.

The conditions referred to have shown improvement as time went on. Today a large number of newspapers are on a perfectly sound basis, and render splendid public service. But many others are still struggling with difficult conditions and any newspaper can always improve its contribution to the community when its business grows.

The rewards of the newspaper profession as a whole are below what the brains and initiative required can win in other fields. Many young men having the gift for political and civic leadership are repelled from an occupation where it is difficult to earn an adequate living.

Desire is forever getting under the feet of judgment and tripping it.

One good way to be efficient is to check up often, and regularly. Being exacting is commendable. It's the crude way of some of us to do it that gets us the reputation of being cranks.
