Ban on Sunday Funerals

There will be no more Sunday funerals in Lake county except in cases specifically provided for under the State health laws of Illinois.

It develops that a meeting was held in White and Tobin's parlors, Waukegan, Saturday last, which was attended by most of the Clergy of Waukegan and practically every undertaker and cemetery sexton in Lake county, at the time the matter of doing away with Sunday funerals was discussed in detail and it was unanimously agreed to discontinue burials in the future excepting in emergency cases.

The new rule is now in effect throughout Waukegan and Lake county, sanctioned and thoroughly endorsed by every person involved in the matter of burial.

The reason this step has been taken is because the undertakers, cemetery help and others, claim that seldom do they have Sunday recreation because so many people plan for funerals on Sunday for relatives, rather than hold them on a week day.

The new rule is operative at once and has been endorsed by those having to do with funerals from Libertyville, Highland Park, Fox Lake, Lake Forest and North Chicago, and practically every community in Lake county.
