

THE POTATO ONCE MORE To the Editor:

Permit me to call attention to valuable article in The Press by Herbert R. Smith, outlining an experiment in planting potatoes which was carried on last year. For the benefit of those who overlooked the article it might be stated that the experiment consisted in planting five varieties of potatoes in parallel three hundred feet rows across the garden and giving these five varieties the same cultural treatment. The experiment showed beyond a doubt that for last season the Irish Cobbler was the most profitable potato to plant. The Early Rose and the Rural New Yorker made a creditable showing and the Early Ohio which seems to be more widely planted here than any other variety yielded very poorly in comparison The entire report with its discussion of conditions affecting the yield of potatoes should be studied by those who intend to plant potatoes this

By way of comment I might state that I conducted a small experiment using a peck each of Early Ohio potatoes and White Rose which Vaughn sells as an improved form of the Early Rose. I found that the Early Ohio had a much shorter season of growth than the White Rose and that its vines were dead four or five weeks before those of the White Rose. This was Mr. H. R. Smith's experience The White Rose produced larger potatoes and about one third more in bulk than the Early Ohio. I would like to see the White Rose and Irish Cobbler planted side by side and given a thorough test.

The leaf-hopper attacked the potato vines about the second week in July and did considerable damage, but not nearly so much as in potato fields which I observed the preceding year. I believe that we could spray our potato vines the last week in June with nicotine sulphate to reduce to a minimum the danger from the leaf-hopper. At that time the leaf-hopper is likely to be in its early stages of development and can be more easily reached by spray. Later on these insects fly quickly away from the vines as one approaches them with the spray. Mr. H. R. Smith sprayed his vines five or six times during the season with a combined spray of bordeaux mixture and arsenate of lead This should be done by everyone who expects to get the best results from planting potatoes, but I believe that we should not neglect to spray at least once for the leaf-hopper.

At this time it seems especially worth while to emphasize what w have been told so many times, namely that those who have gardens can not afford to burn the leaf litter that accumulates in their yards nor cart away their ash piles. Manure fertilizer has reached an almost prohibitive ston 1576, charges reversed or se to rely upon rotted leaves from compost hops with sprinklings of bone meal. Throwing away wood ashes is sifted hard coal ashes are better even Industry, Zion, Ill. Tel. 31-49. than rotted manure for loosening up our sticky clay soil. I would not use coal ashes nor is there any need of this where wagon loads of hard coal ashes go to the dump every day.

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
