TO RAISE FUND FOR LIBRARY SERVICE

\$2,000,000 BEING OBTAINED

No Intensive Drive Methods Being Employed. Books to be Available to Large No. of People

Practical ideas for the better management of the home, tending toward improved sanitation, elimination of waste, better environment for children, and general improvement in all household conditions, are quickly available through books devoted to home science, which are to be found in public libraries and their branches. Aid and advice to women who seek such information is provided by skilled librarians and the wider use of such volumes is encouraged.

Thorough acquaintance with the modern science of housekeeping will do much to solve many of the daily problems confronting women in the home and lighten the burdens that often are extremely heavy. information is authentic and proves of immense value to the housewife.

In its "Books for Everybody" movement, the American Library Association, in cooperation with public libraries and other agencies, is promoting extension of library service to bring the best books within easy reach of the 60,000,000 persons in the United States who are today without such facilities or have but a limited opportunity for obtaining good reading matter.




