M. E. CHURCH

Last Sunday's Services
Last Sunday was an epoch making day for Grace M. E. church. The day started most auspiciously with the largest attendance the S. S. has had this year. One hundred sixteen attended the S. S. Enough of the regulars were absent to have made the attendance at least one hundred thirty. The offering was just about normal, \$7. We call attention to this not to boast but to indicate that the present attainment indicates the almost unlimited possibilities of the future. Let the motto of every member and adherent of this S. S. and church be, "boost, boost, boost! Keeping ever in mind that "the race is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong," but to the true and the faithful victory is promised thru grace; "not by might nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord of hosts."

The S. S. was followed by the most largely attended communion service this church has seen since the present pastorate. The entire hour was given to this impressive service. Open Air Service.

The weather was forbidding. It rained! Was it advisable to attempt such a service? Would anyone attend? O yes, we knew that five or six men would be there. We met at the Epworth League service. When the time arrived for the open air service we left the room. One of the men suggested what was in the mind of every man—"shall we get to the basement for prayer?" We entered that place already made sacred by the earnest prayers of the Business Men's gospel teams during our special service. The prayers were simple and straight from the heart. One young woman's voice was heard in that circle. We arose from our knees and went in silence to the place of meeting. When we arrived there we found the North Shore commons lighted by twenty-five lamps arranged in a V-shape.

Were the people there? Within ten minutes over forty persons were standing about the place. And when we looked about we discovered that these people were, for the most part, our regular attendants at church services. We were a little late to catch the throng. But it was heartening to see our people come to such a service when the rain was descending in ever increasing quantities. A few songs were sung, a short address given, a few personal testimonials from men who knew of the doctrine that it is from God and not from men, and we returned to the church for the regular service. We were again pleased to find that the auditorium was comfortably filled. At the end of this service two men came to the altar of the church seeking admission thereto. So closed a day filled with strenuous toil for the most of us but also full of promise for the future.
