**TO HOLD MEMORIAL DAY PARADE IN CHICAGO**

**WOMEN WILL PARTICIPATE**

Affair to Start at 2 p. m. Monday, May 31st. Automobiles Wanted for Disabled Men

The following plans for the Memorial day parade on the afternoon of May 31 were formulated at a meeting of the committee appointed for this purpose.

Each Post will form a separate unit in The American Legion section of the parade. Formation will be in single rank with a sixteen-file front. Civilian clothes will be worn.

In addition to their own members Posts are urged to invite all ex-service persons in their respective communities to participate.

Each Post is requested to provide a canvas placard 24 inches long and 18 inches high mounted on a stick for carrying five feet long and containing the following sign in black letters:

POST  
No. ....  
This will be carried by the right guide of the Post formation.

Several bands will be provided by the general committee but Posts should provide additional music wherever possible, whether band or field music.

The definite time and place of assembly will be announced in a later bulletin and through the press. The time of assembly will probably be about 2 p. m., May 31.

Each Post commander is requested to appoint immediately one member of his Post to cooperate with the general committee in arranging for his Post's participation in the parade.

Ex-service women will form a separate unit in the Legion division of the parade. The question of whether or not uniforms will be prescribed for this section will be decided following the recommendation of a special women's committee.

It will be necessary to provide transportation for several hundred wounded and disabled comrades who desire to take part in the parade. Any member who can furnish or secure the use of an automobile for this purpose is requested to notify this office of the name, address and telephone number of the person who will furnish the machine.

It is strongly urged that every Post in the Chicago district apply itself vigorously to the task of getting all ex-service persons possible to participate in this parade, the first opportunity we have had since all of our members have returned home to unite in paying respect to the memory of our fallen comrades.

**Y. W. C. A. CAMPAIGN FOR FUNDS UNDER WAY**

\$175,000 in Subscriptions Turned in. Reports Given Daily at La Salle Hotel

Subscriptions totaling \$175,000 were announced at the opening luncheon of the Young Women's Christian association of Chicago, which was held last Monday at the Hotel La Salle for workers who are helping to raise the \$1,000,000 called for in the 1920 budget of the association. The total every day since has been growing, and it is expected that by next Tuesday, May 25, the entire sum will be pledged. There are 700 workers active in the campaign, most of who meet at the daily luncheons given for the purpose of hearing reports of work accomplished and methods used with the greatest success. Among the noon day speakers have been the Rev. Charles W. Gilkey of the Hyde Park Baptist church, the Rev. John Timothy Stone of the Fourth Presbyterian church, the Rev. James G. K. McClure, of McCormick Theological seminary, and others. One of the features of the luncheons is the miniature newspaper that is issued daily with news of the campaign and the workers. The Y. W. C. A. is non-sectarian in its profession, being open for all girls who wish to enjoy its privileges, no matter of what race or creed. The money raised in the campaign will be spent largely for providing more housing facilities for the women and girls of the city, and for equipping summer camps for business and teen-age girls. Women and girls in all parts of Chicago and suburbs profit directly or indirectly by the extension program of the Young Women's Christian association.

Community Service Committee to Secure Judge From Chicago for Saturday

The management, however, feel that to continue the dances throughout the summer would inflict a lot of work upon the volunteers, and inasmuch as volunteer workers are scarce, it may become necessary to abandon them, by reason of the fact that volunteers are not offering their services as they did during the war period.

A corps of about ten adults are necessary to run the dance each evening, and at times it is rather hard to obtain them.

Tickets of admission are required by everybody next Saturday night, and will be insisted upon. No desirable persons will be refused admittance, but it is the desire of the management to have everyone obtain a ticket which means that someone has vouched for them.

Each person will be required to give their name and address, and endorsed by someone on the board, or on the advisory board, or by some one of the hostesses in attendance, names of which appeared in the Highland Park Press of last week.
