EXPLAIN WINTER WORK OF ARDEN SHORE CAMP

hundred boys. With the exception of a small number of boys who were at camp but a few days, the average short stay has been seven or eight weeks, with the longer rests averaging three and four months, the length of time depending upon the quickness and response in health of boys. In two or three cases where improvement has been slow the boys will have spent the whole season of over six months at camp.

A superintendent, trained nurse, physical director and housekeeping staff have cared for the boys. Accurate charts of their conditions have been kept, showing progress made from week to week. Special feeding, organized work and play, and rest periods have filled the days, and the results have been so successful as to win high praise from one of the authorities in the country on the undernourished child.

When the boys were in condition to get their certificate they "graduated" from camp and in practically all instances went to work immediately. One friend of the Association, an employer of considerable labor, found places for a number of boys in his own plant, and to carry on the work started at Arden Shore, furnished ex-
