HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

Deerfield High school track team finished second in the Illinois university track meet held at Champaign Saturday, May 22, of a field of 20 schools. Oak Park won first place, scoring in almost every event. Deerfield scored 25 points.

David Kimball, captain of the Deerfield team, was awarded the Sachem cup for the best individual performance. Kimball established a new world record in the 220 yard low hurdles of 24.2-5 seconds. The former interscholastic record was held by Frank Loomis. Dave also won the 110 yard high hurdles in 16.2-5 and ran anchor man on the relay team, beating Coffin of Oak Park by 15 yds.

The relay race, the feature of the day was won by Deerfield. The team was composed by Proctor, Jackson, McIlwain and Kimball. Oak Park was second, and Springfield third.

McIlwain of Deerfield made a good showing, getting second in the high hurdles and third in the shot put. Proctor took third place in the 220 yard dash. Stewart placed third in the 220 low hurdles and Lauridson took fourth place in the javelin throw.

Altogether Deerfield brought home two medals and two cups. Deerfield was one of the smallest schools entered in the meet and therefore the team deserves a great deal of credit for making so excellent a showing. The success of the team is due largely to the conscientious and persistent work on the part of Coach Rothacher whose efforts during the past four years with the men who are now seniors are the factors that make the Deerfield team one which Highland Park ought to be proud to claim.


The relay race was by far the most exciting race of the afternoon. It was nip and tuck all the way between Deerfield, Oak Park and Springfield. In the drawing Deerfield got the pole. Proctor running first for Deerfield got a slow start and ran third until the last 100 yards. He then pulled up past Springfield and at the take off ran even with Oak Park. Jackson took up the race running about even with Oak Park and Springfield, the latter falling back toward the end of the 220. McIlwain ran third and passed Oak Park almost at the start, at the end of his race he led by almost five strides. Here Kimball took up the race for Deerfield and Coffin for Oak Park. The rival athletic rounded into the home stretch neck and neck, but Kimball with a burst of speed left the feet runner and crossed the line a winner by 15 yards.

Although Oak Park won the meet Deerfield was the outstanding team, winning the hurdles and the relay, not to mention setting a new world interscholastic record.

Before a crowd of 3000 persons assembled for the Illinois-Wisconsin baseball game David Kimball was presented the Sachem Cup. As he stepped out to receive the cup from the hands of Bob Emery, Illinois varsity track captain, a deafening cheer, led by Rodney Mason, rose in recognition and admiration of his remarkable feat.

Fairchild Doty, Deerfield '16, managed the Illinois university interscholastic track meet, the largest meet of its kind in the middle west. It was run off in a very creditable fashion, there being no complaints made, which speaks well for the former Deerfield student.

It may be of interest to former Deerfield students to know that Oliver N. Wilton of Lake Forest, class of '16, has been elected president of the junior class at the University of Illinois. Wilton is also director of the student union.



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
