MEMORIAL SERVICE SUNDAY AFTERNOON

HONOR THE CITY'S HEROES

Ceremony Held at Presbyterian Church, Interesting Address by the Rev. P. C. Wolcott

The community memorial service held on Sunday afternoon, May 30, in the Presbyterian church was attended by somewhat more than two hundred people, and was a dignified and impressive occasion. It is to be regretted that the auditorium was not crowded to its capacity in honor of the men and women of this community who died in the service of our country.

The Rev. P. C. Wolcott in his address paid tribute to the fine courage and splendid idealism of our soldiers and sailors and called attention to the fact that after the strain of every great war in history there has been a period of relapse and slackened fiber similar to that through which we are now passing. None so pronounced and dangerous, however, since there never was a war so terrible.

He predicted an ultimate recovery if only we can summon the forces of sane patriotism to the support of our country in the present crisis, and stated his conviction that while we seem to have permitted the fruits of victory to slip from our grasp that we shall yet recover our poise and enjoy the blessings won by the heroism of our soldiers.

The audience rose while the names of those from our community who died in service were read and a fitting tribute was paid to their sacrifices.

RUNS NAIL IN FOOT; SUES HIGHLAND PARK

\$5,000 Damages Asked of City in Bill Filed in Circuit Court

The city of Highland Park is made defendant in a \$5,000 damage suit filed in circuit court at Waukegan today by Wilford Johnson, a minor, by Jennie Johnson, his next friend. The Johnsons live at 831 Massachusetts avenue, Chicago.

The declaration charges that during the summer of 1918 the city of Highland Park maintained a public raft which was anchored in front of its public bathing beach for the use of bathers and those desiring to dive. On August 16, 1918, according to the bill, Wilford Johnson paid to the city of Highland Park a fee of 30 cents for the privilege of bathing opposite the bathing beach and using the raft.

It was the duty of the city, the declaration charges, to keep the raft in good repair, but in spite of this there were nails in it and young Johnson ran one in his foot while on the raft. He was laid up for some time and had a big doctor bill to pay. He thinks he is entitled to damages from the city.

DEATH TAKES OLD RESIDENT SATURDAY

Mrs. Mary Glader Passes Away Following a Brief Illness. Funeral Monday

Mrs. Mary Glader, nee Engle, aged 82 years, 1 month and 19 days, passed away Saturday morning, May 29, at her home in Green Bay road, following a brief illness.

Mrs. Glader was born April 10, 1838, in Germany. After her marriage to Fred Glader, they emigrated to America and settled in Highland Park sixty-two years ago. Here they purchased a tract of 20 acres on S. Green Bay road, and endured the hardships of early settlers. Later on they bought a farm a few miles west of the town, from which they retired twenty years ago, and built a home at 113 S. Green Bay road. Mr. Glader died ten years ago.

Mrs. Glader's death is mourned by nine children, thirty three grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Decoration day at the Lutheran church, with the Rev. Suhr officiating. Interment was made in the Deerfield cemetery.

AMERICAN PEDIATRIC SOCIETY MEETS HERE
