PEONY AND IRIS SHOW JUNE 19TH AND 20TH

AT THE GORTON SCHOOL

Several Lake Forest People to Open Their Gardens to Visitors on These Days

On Saturday and Sunday, June 19th and 20th the North Shore Horticultural Society, associated with the Garden Club of Illinois will hold a Peony and Iris Show at the Gorton School in Lake Forest.

Lake Forest Flower Shows have always been good but for some reason the horticultural world has not flocked to see them but with the renewed interest in gardening which has come with the end of the war this one is expected to set a new record. Since Peonies and Irises do exceptionally well in our North Shore soil and should be at the height of their beauty about June 20th, they are given first place but there will be many other sorts of flowers at the show and classes for everything from seed flowers to Greenhouse plants.

With the Horticultural Society Committee is working a committee of ladies of the Garden Club of Illinois. They will supervise the purely ornamental classes such as table decorations and flower arrangements, and will use whatever influence they may have to bring in neighboring garden clubs en masse to the show. Special classes are being arranged for these garden clubs and it is hoped that many beautiful and interesting exhibitions will be brought from a distance. The committee of the Garden Club of Illinois is Mrs. Walter S. Brewster, chairman, Mrs. C. Morse Ely; Mrs. Hugh J. McBirney; Mrs. Joseph M. Patterson, and Mrs. A. A. Sprague. The chairman will gladly send details to any Garden Club that may be interested.

Although the flowers which will be brought to the show are expected to be very beautiful, the exhibitions will not end there. Several Lake Forest people including Mrs. John T. Pirie, Mrs. Charles Schweppe and Mrs. Brewster will open their gardens on both June 19th and 20th to all visitors to the show. This opportunity to see some of the interesting and beautiful Lake Forest places should bring many out-of-town visitors. Mrs. Brewster's June Garden which is planted principally with Peonies and Irises should be at its best. Mrs. Pirie has a charming Peony and Iris walk and though Mrs. Schweppe's Rose Garden may not be at the height of its bloom it is sure to be beautiful.

A special effort will be made to induce the owners of small gardens to exhibit and a schedule has been arranged that gives equal opportunities to all. You may exhibit three Peonies or hundreds; you may enter a beautifully arranged vase of flowers or a group of flowering Greenhouse plants. Since the Gorton School affords more room than has been available in former years the arrangement of exhibits will be carefully considered in making awards.

The schedule, a copy of which may be had upon application to Mr. J. R. Clarke, Corresponding Secretary, should tempt everyone with a garden to exhibit and everyone without a garden to come and see how much beauty and pleasure they have missed. The tickets, which include admission to the five or six gardens to be opened to the public will be fifty cents.

DELINQUENT TAX SALE BEGINS MONDAY, JUNE 21

The sale of property for payment of delinquent taxes begins June 21, by county treasurer, Roy Bracher. Fewer descriptions will be offered for sale this year than last even though considerable property upon which only partial payments were made owing to the granting of an injunction are included therein.

There is a question whether the property involved in the injunction will ever be sold for taxes. It will be sold however if the court does not restrain the county treasurer. In case the court does not prevent the sale the owners in all probability will pay the remainder just before the sale opens. Those who paid their partial taxes paid only 82 per cent and it is for the delinquent 18 per cent that the property has been included in the tax sale.
