His debating and oratorical work has made him well known among the colleges of Illinois, and his ability has brought him a fellowship in Union Theological seminary. Prayer service is held every Wednesday evening at 8 p. m. Sunday school at 10 a. m. This is important: if the daylight saving law goes into effect in Highland Park as it will in Chicago, the services will all start and hour earlier.

TRINITY CHURCH

Services in Trinity Church on Sunday, June 13, will conform to the new time schedule which goes into effect that morning.

At 9:30 the commencement exercises of the Sunday School will be held, reports will be made and prizes awarded and pupils who have satisfactorily completed their grades will be promoted.

ELM PLACE SCHOOL

The program for the closing week of school is as follows:

Monday, June 14, Flag Day exercises, beginning at 9 a. m. in the auditorium. These will be followed by the annual parade of the colors. At the close of the ceremony the school picnic will begin. Lunches will be eaten at 11:30 and after this the field meet and athletic contests will take place. Something will be going on in the building all the time. Miss Esther White's pupils will give a "show" at 10:30 in the morning. There will be other shows in the afternoon. Ice cream and candies will be on sale as usual. TRUCK PNEUMATICS DO NOT PUNCTURE

One phase of the use of pneumatic truck tires which has worried the truck owner to no small degree is the possibility of punctures.

"Regarding punctures," says W. V. Logan, manager of the pneumatic truck tire department of the United States tire company, "our records show that an owner need not have a moment's worry about them. I have records of trucks operated in practically every class of business, showing that pneumatic truck tires have been in service anywhere from one year to two and one-half years, and during the entire time have never been off the rims.

"The rural free delivery division of the United States post office department operates a fleet of trucks on pneumatics that is probably larger than any other in the country. They have had so few punctures that they no longer believe it necessary to carry spares.

"As for mileage, I find in our records reports on set after set of tires which have rendered better than 20,000 miles. We have records through the United States in practically every class of service of from 10,000 to 50,000 miles, and those of 40,000 to 50,000 were in extremely hard service. The United States Nobby Cord Pneumatic is especially adapted for rough or muddy roads where good traction is essential."

TELEPHONE OPERATORS GET RAISE IN WAGES

In the ever increasing effort to render service to the public in Aurora, the Chicago Telephone company announces an alteration in the scale of wages and bonuses. Telephone operators will now receive an increase of \$3.00 a week. This sum is made up from the amount that was given as a bonus every three months for regular attendance and service, approximately \$25.00, plus the difference in the wage increase. This wage increase will not only apply to all those operators now in the company's employ, but to all those who seek employment in the telephone industry as operators.

In the long run, the telephone company feels that every stimulus will be added to the recruiting campaign to obtain suitable operators by this increase of wages. The prospective operator of 16 years of age, with the usual necessary education but without any knowledge of the business whatever, will be paid while learning and after graduation in one of the telephone company's training departments, where she will be taught the profession, will be started on the road to prosperity, to earn a competent living.

It is hoped by this change and the boost in the wage scale that more applicants will be tempted to serve the public need as telephone operators.

The company states that the burden of these wage adjustments should convince the most skeptical, that nothing is left undone to render service equal to the public need and that, when the rate increases asked for, come before the Utilities commission

for hearing that their patrons will cheerfully agree to pay such adequate adjustment as the Utility commission sees fit to grant, realizing as they must do, that money in huge sums, such as this expenditure incurs, does not grow on trees, but must be willingly borne by the subscribers in the system in exchange for service rendered.

The telephone company unequivocally states that it is only by this means that they can maintain its forces and endeavor to satisfy the public.

The change took effect May 30th.
