LOCAL GIRLS TAKE PART IN PAGEANT

Mary Tapper and Katherine Lytton Prominent in Kemper Hall Affair

The Misses Mary Tapper and Katherine Lytton of this city took prominent parts in the Kemper hall pageant which was held Tuesday.

Students of Kemper Hall, Kenosha, Wis., an Episcopal school under the supervision of the Sisters of St. Mary, wrote a pageant entitled "The Old World and the New," founded on historical incidents from Bible times to the present day, as the principal feature of the school's fiftieth anniversary and commencement.

Tuesday afternoon and evening (June 8), were set for the performance, every detail of which was directed by the students themselves. Elaborate costumes and stage settings were designed, and made in the school studio and the young actors had the assistance of the Chicago Symphony orchestra in the production. A colorful lantern parade thru the grounds followed the pageant.

The anniversary is also marked by payment of the school's entire bonded indebtedness, \$100,000, which has been subscribed to by 200 friends of the institution. Commencement exercises opened with Baccalaureate Sunday on June 6th, and closed yesterday (Wednesday), June 9, with an "Old Girls' Banquet."

GRADUATION EXERCISES AT U. OF I. JUNE 16TH

Champaign, Ill., June 9.—The forty-ninth annual commencement of the University of Illinois occurs on Wednesday, June 16. Approximately 950 degrees will be conferred by the institution at that time.

Commencement week is inaugurated with the baccalaureate service on Sunday, June 13. The Rev. John Timothy Stone, D. D., pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian church, Chicago, will conduct the devotional exercises, and the music for the occasion will be under the direction of Professor J. Lawrence Erb, University organist and director of the School of Music.

Monday, June 14, is Class Day, the exercises occurring at 9:30 a. m. The

class officers, who will preside, are: President, Ramond C. Haas of South Bend, Ind.; Vice-president, Katherine Huff, of Champaign; Secretary, Caroline Manspeaker, of Champaign, and Treasurer, Alvin T. Anderson, of Wheaton. The salutatory address will be delivered by Hans C. Thory of Chicago; the Hatchet Oration by John Powell of Kansas City, Mo.; the response of A. A. Arnold of Palmerton, Pa.; Miss Caroline Manspeaker of Champaign will read the Class History, and Warner G. Rice of Aurora will deliver the valedictory address.

The annual senior ball occupies Monday night, Tuesday, June 15, is Alumni Day when reunions of graduates of years gone by will be held. Receptions and band concerts bring the day to a close.

The Commencement exercises occur at 10 o'clock the next morning, Wednesday, June 16. The annual address will be delivered by Robert E. Vinson, D. D., LL.D., president of the University of Texas. Dr. David Kinley, president of the University of Illinois, will confer the degrees.
