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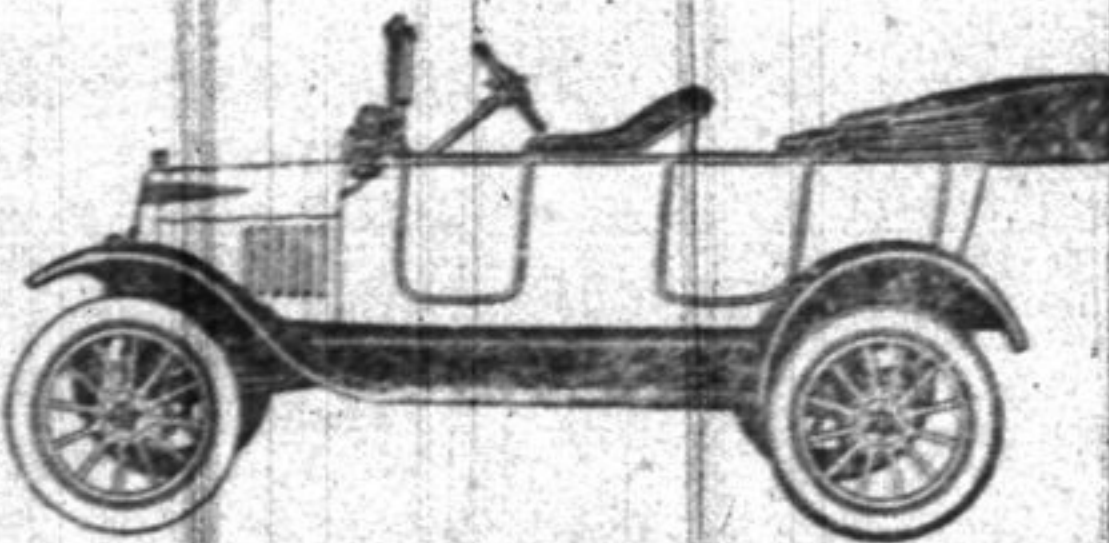

Mrs. Robert Pettis entertained at a twelve o'clock luncheon Wednesday in honor of her sister, Elizabeth, who is to be a June bride.

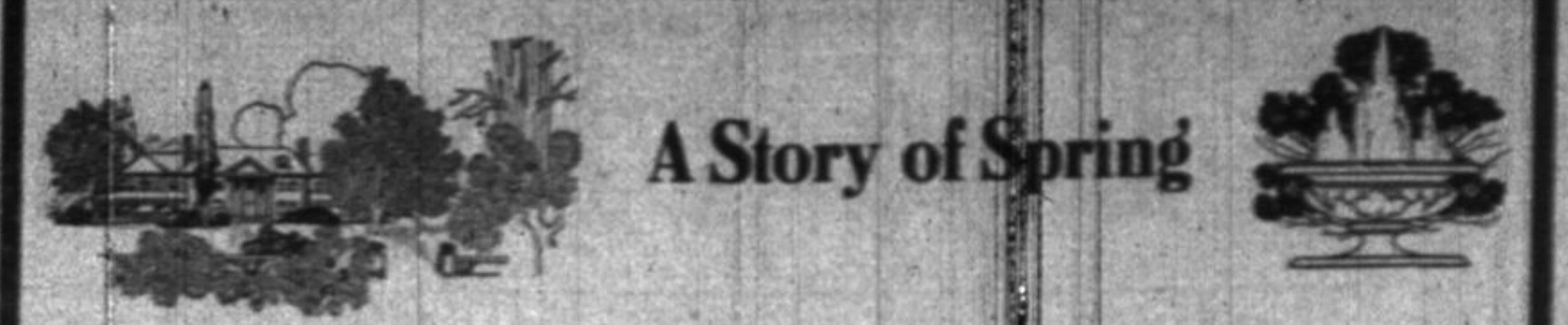
