NATIONAL GUARD TO BE REORGANIZED

Chairman Wetmore today gave an outline of the purposes of the commission:
"Fundamental guarantees of American citizenship.
"Maintenance of respect for our laws and the preservation and protection of life and property.
"Building up of a well-trained and physically fit body of citizens actuated by motives of unselfish devotion to the state, whose common privileges we all enjoy and appreciate and which the citizens of the state intend to have perpetuated.

"That the service of the young men of this country in the National Guard is the highest expression of good citizenship.

"That the conditions surrounding that service shall be as worthy as the service itself.

"That such service can and shall be made attractive and beneficial in all ways to this membership.

"That the establishment of an efficient National Guard, full of the highest spirit and morale, shall be realized at once and maintained in perpetuity by the citizens of Chicago.

"With full co-operation of the people of Chicago we shall have the finest National Guard organization in the Union, a credit to the city and representative of the 'I Will' spirit, and a tower of strength upon which they may rely in time of need."

Many committees have been appointed to carry on the various features of the plan outlined by the commission. These committees include industrial, recruiting, speakers, publicity, service, educational, athletics, service and social, finance, legislative and military council.

The educational work will be one of the important features. It will include training in English, American Constitution, history and traditions in citizen's duties, responsibilities and privileges by lectures, motion pictures and reading materials in the Regimental libraries. The athletic committee will have an extensive program. All kinds of sports will be promoted in the various armories for the pleasure and physical well-being of the members of the Guard. One of the ultimate plans of this committee is to arrange for an inter-Regimental League of athletics.
