On Education and Libraries (Elsie Baker, Highland Park)

The world is rapidly going through a series of changes. America can never be what it was before the war. We must develop a new spirit, a spirit not unlike that in the year 1776. This is a great day to learn the art of leadership—of freedom. The foundation of it all is education. Education is civilization's dynamo. Democracy's work depends on what the demos knows and understands. Where education is general and liberal, it drives out both narrow and sleepy-mindedness. Without it, business progress is not possible and every worker is unqualified. Can we not be made to realize that the youth of today is the America of tomorrow and of all time? Is the youth of today to go through the same routine that the youths of old endured? Or are we to provide the essentials for the higher education needed today?

Are you moving farther away from its rays, or are you benefiting from them and seeking always for their source? You cannot but feel the world's hum-drum, who could not find solace in a library? Elizabeth Barrett Browning tells us, how poetically, that

"We get no good  
By being ungenerous, even to a book  
And calculating profits, so much help  
By so much reading. It is rather when  
We gloriously forget ourselves and plunge  
Soul-forward, headlong, into a book's profound,  
Impassioned for its beauty and salt  
of truth—  
'Tis then we get the right good  
from a book."
