## CHICAGO BACKING ZION CITY ROAD

Three Big Organizations of that City Ready to Raise \$15,000 by Subscription

The construction of a hard road thru Zion City on Sheridan road is assured through the co-operation of three Chicago organizations, who, Monday went on record as being not only heartily in favor of the project but promised to raise their quota of \$15,000 through popular subscription.

George H. Baird, chairman of the Lake County supervisors, and W. C. Hollister, secretary of the Waukegan-North Chicago Chamber of Commerce, on Thursday were in conference with officials of the Chicago Motor club, the Chicago Motor Truck club and the Chicago Association of Commerce, all of whom assured the Waukegan men that nothing would be left undone to bring about the improvement of Sheridan road thru Zion at the earliest possible moment.

The organizations declared themselves ready to begin the immediate raising of funds. The Chicago Association of Commerce will bring about the co-operation of Chicago merchants, and it was declared that it will be no great problem to raise the needed funds. Mr. Hollister was in Chicago today to continue the conference with the commerce association.
