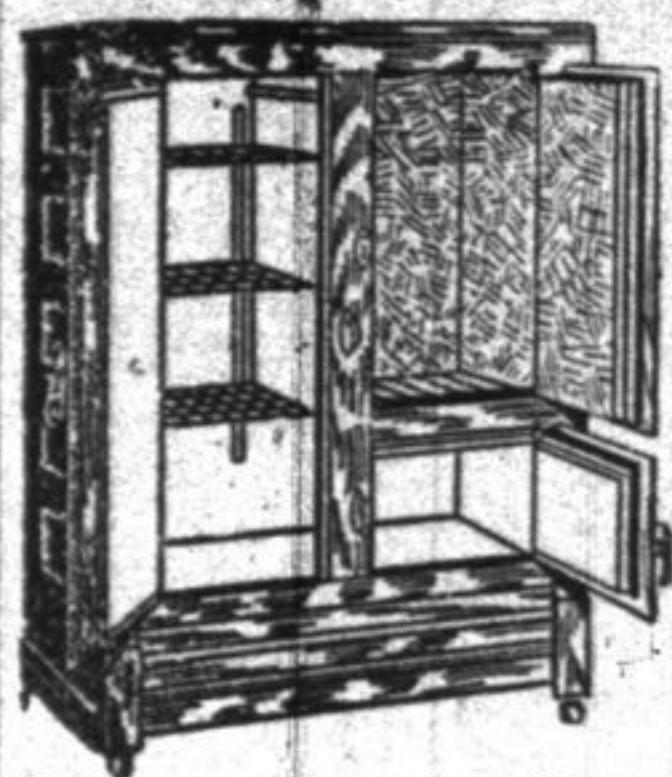

This is the reason and the only reason. If it were not for these heavy increases in wages and material the telephone company would be in a position to render efficient service without any adjustment of rates.

EIGHT POINTS OF THE ADVANCING TOWN — BEAUTY

A politician once remarked in a municipal assembly, that beauty is a luxury, and that it could not be afforded. He was cheered by parsimonious taxpayers. Probably some of them have since wondered why their real estate did not advance more rapidly in value.

The advancing town tries to persuade every householder to plant shrubs and trees and make his home a nest of beauty. No sooner does it lay out a new street than it plants trees.

It lays out vacant tracts of land for parks, and if taxes can't be afforded to beautify them, it calls on the people to hold a community work day, and create a center of beauty. Unused scraps of land at street intersections are made into little nests of greenery. When it puts up buildings, it consults good standards of taste.

All that does not cost a great deal of money. But it spreads a town's reputation far and wide as a live, modern community, of refined and progressive standards.

INFORMATION FOR BUYERS

Never before in the history of business was advertising so informative as now. Originally advertisements were routine kind of notices, in which the seller of merchandise reminded the public of his existence, and handed out vague promises about his goods.

Then for a time there was a tendency to write advertisements that tried to be funny and smart, and attract attention by their cleverness, without giving much information about goods.

The modern ad writer has come down to brass tacks. He tries to tell people in a straightforward way what he has to sell. He describes his line of goods, his styles, and particularly his prices. As a result the buyer can get a very intelligent idea of the state of the market, before he enters any store or looks at any goods.

This is the way any skilled buyer goes to work. The purchasing agent of a business concern would not attempt to make any contracts until he had looked over his trade papers and found out what were the tendencies in the market, what styles were favored, and what prices were being offered. Armed with a careful study of market conditions, he is ready to do business, and can make better trades than the man who took no pains to inform himself.

The newspaper advertising offers to the household and personal buyer, the same service that the trade paper and the market report provide to the corporation purchasing agent. After a study of newspaper advertising the buyer for the home gains a better idea what should be paid for any article.

The careful student of home store advertising should be able to buy 10 to 20 per cent cheaper than the person who pays no attention to the store news.

APPELATE COURT DENIES RE-HEARING

The suit of Olaf Lindbloom of Highland Park against the Purity Ice company, in which Lindbloom charged that the noise from operation of the plant in the vicinity of the plaintiff's place made it a nuisance, was recently up for another hearing.

Lindbloom was represented by Mr. Pope and the circuit court jury gave the plaintiff judgment for \$1.00. The ice company appealed to the appellate court which has just affirmed the judgment of the circuit court. Judge R. K. Welsh of Rockford at that time hearing the case. The appellate court also denied appeal for a rehearing.
