8 POINTS OF THE ADVANCING TOWN—GOOD STORES

The retail stores of a community are the means by which the inhabitants get the material benefits of modern civilization. A town without good stores fails to share the marvelous progress of these wonderful days. It is not equipped on a twentieth century basis.

The way to get good stores, is to encourage the merchants to expand and develop their services. And the way to give them this encouragement is to buy all possible supplies at home. If any line or article can be found which they do not keep, let them order it for you. They will give you the benefit of their expert purchasing ability.

A town in which the people are loyal to the home stores, is a town where the merchants are alert, enterprising, ambitious for expansion, and confident that their enterprise will be supported and rewarded. In short, it is an advancing town.

SEED AND FOOD COSTS

One reason why food production is unsatisfactory, and food costs the consumer high, is that so much of the seed planted by the farmer is poor. The Iowa Experiment station in one year has examined 3300 samples of seed corn for farmers. It found 19 per cent of these seeds dead, and 21 per cent was too weak to be of any value.

It would seem as if every farmer would want to have his seed tested before going to the expense of planting it. Probably the experiment stations of the country would have facilities so that all the farmers could do it. If so, it would abundantly pay to have sufficient facilities added so that adequate tests could be made of all seed supplies.

A great deal of poor seed is worked off. The farmer gets higher prices when as a consequence food production falls off, so that the mass of the people are the worst sufferers.

SERVICE OF PUBLICITY—ADVERTISING YOUR TOWN

When one of the merchants of our city puts an advertisement in our paper, he accomplishes two results:

First, he interests the home public in his business. They form the impression that he is a hustler. They want to see what he has to say about his goods, and subsequently visit his store.

But secondly, he interests the wider public outside his town. If you look over the newspapers from some distant city, and find the merchants are not advertising in those journals, you form the impression that it is a dead town. It would never occur to you to go there to trade.

A paper like ours circulates through a wide extent of territory outside its home town. Many of the subscribers to it also take and read papers from other cities. They compare the business news in those papers. If our

paper has a better run of advertising than those from such places as Waukegan and Evanston they will come here to trade. If the papers in those other towns show a better line of advertising, they will go to the other places.

Also such a paper as ours is compared quite carefully with the big sheets in big centers like Chicago. Our stores do not pretend to rival the metropolitan store in floor space. But they do business for a great deal less money, and by use of publicity, they can undersell them. If they make that fact clear by advertising, a lot of money that now goes to the big centers will stay at home.

A newspaper containing a good line of advertising, makes its home town look like a live one, and spreads its reputation far and wide as a hustling place.

He introduced a bill to allow farmers to join together and collectively ship a car of hay, or grain, or hogs, or milk in order to get a better price without being guilty of conspiracy and liable to arrest and imprisonment. The farmers on the committee got the bill on the floor of the senate and to a vote. It passed by the close shave of one vote. Lawyers opposed it and only eight lawyers voted for it and not a Chicago senator.
