The premiums in the women's departments and the schools have been carefully revised and as usual excellent displays will be found in these departments. The better premiums have been placed on classes that are the most practical and on those in which most people are interested. Classes have also been made for high school displays and Sunday School exhibits.

In order to increase the possibilities of comfort for the women and babies, a large tent has been furnished Mrs. R. L. Redheffer, Deerfield, Ill., the general superintendent of all the women's departments. As during the last fair a Better Babies contest will be a feature this year and babies can be scored at any time during the fair by a competent nurse. Anyone interested should get in touch with Mrs. Redheffer. In the women's departments alone there will be many new and interesting features this year.

The boys and girls stock judging contests will be held as usual, under the direction of Mr. McCoy of Wauconda. The races will be much better than usual as the racing committee has arranged for four days of racing with increased premiums as the following indicates.

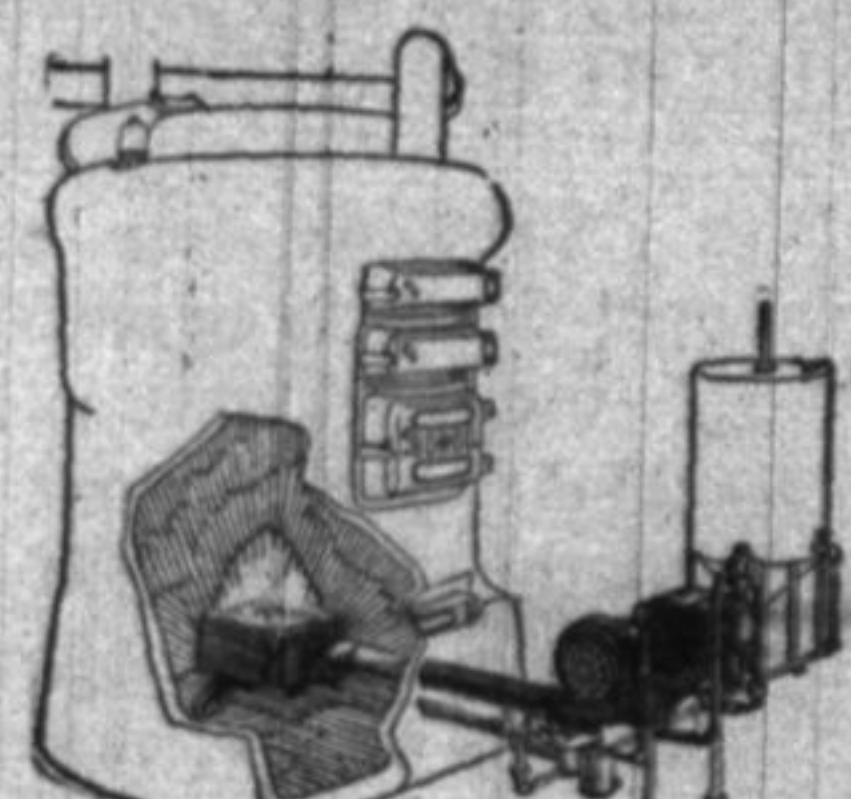
