





E. M. Runyard was born August 20th, 1920, for one five-million gallon 29, 1879, on a farm about two miles pump for the Municipal Water Works, northwest of the Village of Antioch, including all fittings and erected on Illinois. From December 1908, until December 1916, E. M. Runyard served Lake County as Assistant State's Attorney. His record is well known and looked upon with much favor by those who are interested in public affairs.

Mr. Runyard is at present Village Attorney for the Villages of Antioch and Winthrop Harbor, in this County, and represents other public bodies as well as having a large private prac-
