E. M. Runyard was born August 29, 1879, on a farm about two miles northwest of the Village of Antioch, Illinois. He attended the district school after which he became a student at Valparaiso Normal, at Valparaiso, Indiana. Returning to his home he taught school for a period of two years, making his home on the old farm. After two years spent at Northwestern Academy, Evanston, Illinois, he again returned to the scene of his boyhood and taught one year at the Hickory and one year at Channel Lake Schools in Antioch township.

In the fall of 1901 Mr. Runyard began a four year course at the Wisconsin State University, at Madison, Wisconsin, graduating from the law school in June 1905, and was admitted to the practice of law in the State of Illinois in February, 1906.

Deciding to begin his career in Waukegan, Mr. Runyard established an office and soon attracted the attention of older men in the profession, among them being the late Judge Charles Whitney who extended the present candidate for State Senator an invitation to join the law firm of which Charles Whitney was senior member and then came into existence the firm of Whitney, Dady & Runyard, a partnership which existed until Mr. Whitney was elected to a place on the Circuit bench.

From December 1908, until December 1916, E. M. Runyard served Lake County as Assistant State's Attorney. His record is well known, and looked upon with much favor by those who are interested in public affairs.

Mr. Runyard is at present Village Attorney for the Villages of Antioch and Winthrop Harbor, in this County, and represents other public bodies as well as having a large private practice.

RUNNING EXPENSES

As has been said many times by eminent economists Public Utilities must be permitted to earn enough money to pay their way or the general welfare of the Community is impaired.

The fact that the Telephone Company needs an adjustment of rates is solely because it requires additional revenue to meet running expenses.

The expenses of conducting this Utility during the last few years have increased enormously both as to increased wages already being paid out to its employees and the increased prices of all material used in the business.

The dividends to stockholders remain the same and will not be increased. An adjustment of rates is not for this purpose.

But it must be borne in mind that bankers and others who from time to time loan the Telephone Company money demand a higher rate of interest than formerly.

However, the main factor in the rate adjustment is to care for these increases in wages and cost of telephone material.
