TELEPHONE COMPANY HEARING WEDNESDAY

Palatine, Lake Zurich And Wauconda Railroad Pleads for Increased Rates

The State Public Utilities commission has set for hearing in Chicago next Wednesday before Commissioner Lacey the increased telephone rates case of the Central Union Telephone Co. in Waukegan and other Lake county cities on the motion of F. W. Pringle and R. L. Peck of Chicago, attorneys for the defendant cities, that the commission rescind its order of June 30, 1919, granting the phone company any increase of rates in these cities.

The State Public Utilities Commission has also set for hearing in Chicago next Tuesday before Commissioner Wilderson the petition of the Palatine, Lake Zurich and Wauconda railroad Co., for authority to increase their freight rates.

INDEPENDENTS OPEN FIRE

Hold Mass Meeting to Organize Against Voliva Faction; New Bulletin Boards Appear

A mass meeting of Independents was held at Zion last week for the purpose of organizing to fight Overseer Voliva's bulletin boards.

The meeting, presided over by B. G. Hess, was largely attended. It was first intended that it should be held at the Marshall Field Club rooms but this idea was abandoned and the crowd went to what is known among the Independents as the Grace Missionary church. The Independents want a wide-open town, and the meeting Monday night was a protest against any laws that might tend to bar things that are looked upon by the Zionists as evil and a menace.

The Zionists contend that they founded the city, came from all parts of the world for religious and civil liberty; and for the express purpose of founding a church home where they could live out their religious convictions without molestation, and in peace. Voliva's war on Marshall Field and Company and on the Independents generally is now going on in full swing. Bulletin boards are going up by the scores, and some very near to Independents headquarters. A treble sign, light at night with electric reflectors has just been erected half a block from the Grace Missionary church. These signs contain a first and last warning. The "First Warning" says:

"Every foot of this city is consecrated ground, and belongs to God. The land is leased—not sold. Numerous restrictions run with the land. The city was established as the exclusive headquarters of the Christian Catholic Apostolic church in Zion, and as the private headquarters of the officers and members. All visitors should report at the Administration building where they will be welcomed and shown every courtesy.—Wilbur Glenn Voliva.

Then follows a sign containing a "Last Warning." This sign partly faces the Independent church and reads:

"Other than Zion families should keep away from this city as a place of residence. The day is not far off when you will wish you had heeded this warning. No outside institutions of any kind are needed or wanted. This city was established for Zion people only and the war will go on day and night until the city is fully redeemed, and the Zion flag floats over every foot of ground and over every shingle. God the Almighty in His Own way and time will bring these things to pass. Eventually all who do not line up for God and Zion will have to go. Go now and keep out of trouble. There are thousands of cities of the world where you can

go and live. Go and go quickly."—Wilbur Glenn Voliva.

Bulletin boards are springing up in Zion overnight. The war is on, and on in earnest! A redhot bulletin board is being painted in red letters which tells smokers they have as much right to spit in drinking water as they have to smoke up the air that people breathe.

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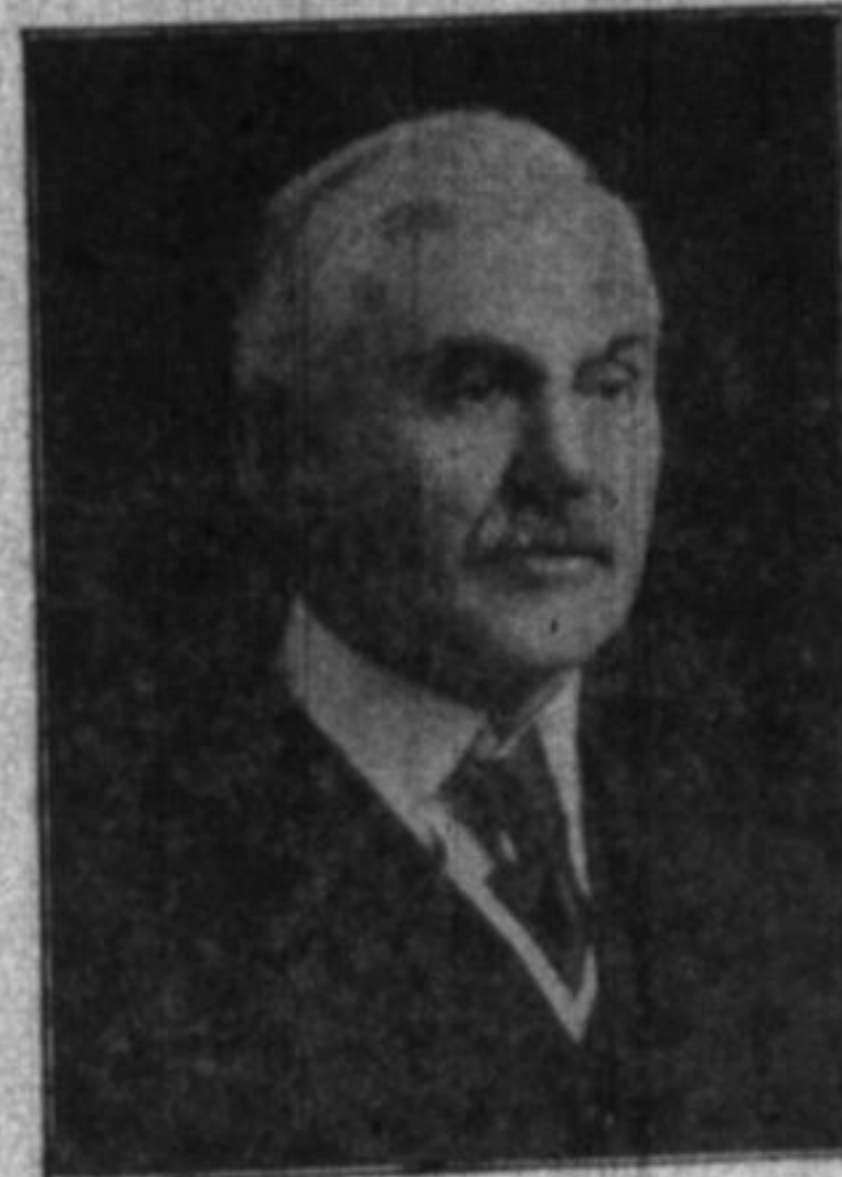
