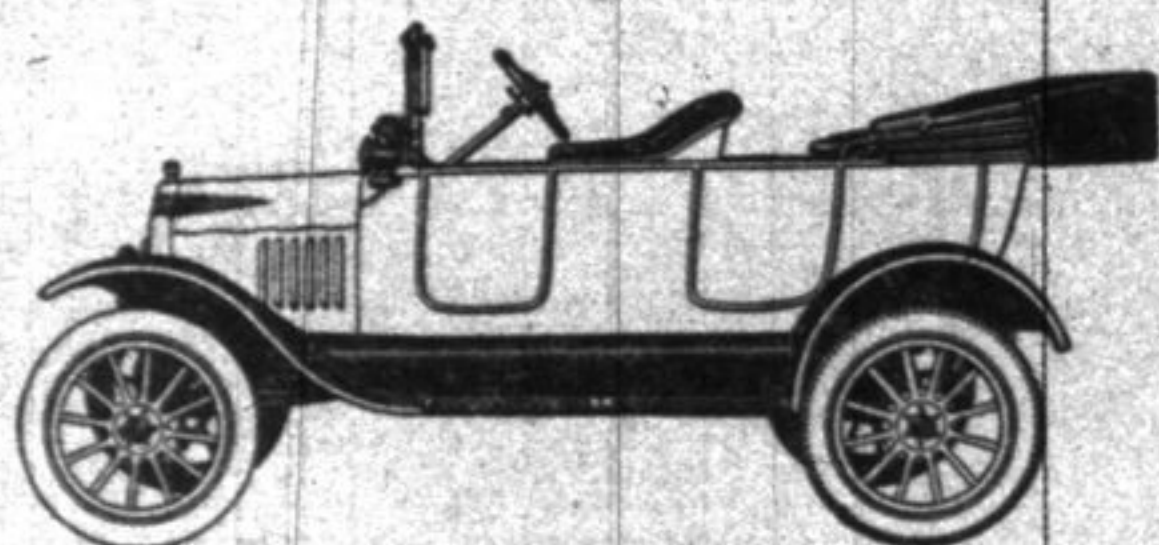

DISCOVERS CAUSE OF OAK TREE DESTRUCTION

M. BOHL SOLVES MYSTERY

Former Highland Park Finds "Borer" Responsible. Sends Affected Twigs to Government Station

The following articles were taken from "The Holland (Mich.) Sentinel," of July 28 and August 18. Mr. Bohl, who is spoken of in these articles, is well known in Highland Park as he is a former resident of this city.

"M. Bohl, a well known North Side orchardist, has solved the mystery of the cause of the destruction of oak trees on the North Side. For weeks past the North Side people have been finding numerous twigs under the oak trees there, twigs that were live wood and for the dropping of which there seemed no excuse except that they seemed to have been gnawed off. These twigs were in many cases several feet long and some of them as thick as a man's thumb. The ground under some of the trees was literally covered with these twigs and there seems danger that many beautiful trees will be denuded and killed.

"Some held the theory that the work of destruction was being done by a beetle or locust something like the famous '17-year locust.' But no one was able to verify this theory, and now Mr. Bohl has disproved it and has at the same time revealed the real cause.

"The cause of the damage is a little gray worm about three-quarters of an inch in length and about as thick as the lead in an ordinary lead pencil. Mr. Bohl brought several twigs to town today and slitting open the twig uncovered the worm in every instance.

"Their method of work is unusual. In each case they enter by way of a little dead side twig. Getting in at the very tip of this either as an egg or as an embryo worm, they gradually bore their way into the live wood. After working their way into this for some distance, they gnaw off the whole twig, dropping with it to the ground.

"Mr. Bohl has sent a box full of the twigs to the federal experiment station at La Fayette, Ind., and he is awaiting a report. Meanwhile he is advising people who wish to save their trees to cut out all the dead twigs, as that is the only way the worms seem to be able to enter."

The second article deals with the answer received by Mr. Bohl from the entomologist at the experiment station:

"M. Bohl, North Side orchardist, has received an answer from the government entomologist at La Fayette, Ind., to whom he recently sent a collection of oak twigs that dropped from trees on the North Side, caused by a little gray worm biting them off. A large number of trees were harmed on the North Side by this insect, and Mr. Bohl sent the twigs to the government station to discover the cause.

"In his answer, W. H. Larimer, scientific assistant of the station, states that the damage is done by what is popularly known as the 'Maple and Oak Twig Pruner.' The scientific name of the insect is 'Elaphidion Villosum Fabr.' It usually attacks oak and maple trees, but occasionally also apple, pear, plum, peach, grape, quince, orange osage, hickory, chestnut, locust, sassafras and sumac.

"According to the report of the government official, the insect is not particularly dangerous. However, it frequently destroys the symmetry of shade trees and for that reason it is very desirable to destroy the insect.

"The insect deposits an egg in one of the smaller twigs and the young larva bores its way into larger twigs. In the early fall it bites off the twig and falls safely to the ground with it. In the spring it develops into a beetle.

"The way to destroy the pest is to collect the fallen twigs some time during the winter and burn them. This prevents them developing into beetles and stops their work and the development of a new crop of insects."
