FORT SHERIDAN NEW CORPS HEADQUARTERS

GEN. WOOD COMMANDER

Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Corps Areas Grouped into Second Army with Headquarters at Chicago

Washington, D. C. — Ft. Sheridan, Ill., will be the headquarters of the Sixth Corps Area, comprising the states of Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, effective September 1, under the plan of reorganization of the army from geographical divisions as at present into corps and Army areas announced by the War Department.

This headquarters will replace the present headquarters of the Central Department at Chicago, but temporarily the headquarters of the area will be maintained at Chicago until space is available at Fort Sheridan.

Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, at present commanding officer of the Central department has been named commander of the 6th Corps Area.

The 4th, 5th and 6th Corps Areas will be grouped into the 2nd Army with headquarters probably at Chicago.

The corps areas are established for purposes of administration, training and tactical control.

It is understood that after October 1, the hospital at the fort will be reduced to a 200 bed capacity, and will be located in the old post hospital. All the new buildings belonging to Hospital No. 28 will then be vacated.

A resident of Chicago, who frequently makes his home in Paris for a long period, compares this forest to the Chateau Therry forest outside of Paris where our American troops started the beginning of the end of the late war. We cannot conceive a safer or better estate for rich men.

CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES GET A BIG BONUS

Approximately 50 civilian employees at Fort Sheridan and about 550 more at Great Lakes naval training station Monday were informed that their bonuses, so long expected, had arrived, and all those in the government service more than six months received checks amounting from \$20 to \$200. The employees in the service 17 months received bonuses of \$30 a month for 11 months. The bonuses had been before Congress for many months.
