AUGUST NOW LEADS AS "MONTH OF BRIDES"

321 Marriage Licenses Issued at Waukegan During Month of August

The month of June must step aside as a month of brides, August now leading in Lake County.

For example, the records at Waukegan show that during the month of August this year, a total of 321 marriage licenses were issued. This is far in excess of the number issued in August last year which had a record of 223. August, this year, even exceeded August 1918, when the slacker rush to get married and avoid military service was on. A total of 313 licenses were issued in August of that year.

The month of June always has borne the title of the "Month of Brides" but will have to relinquish in favor of August for in June this year there were but 262 licenses. In July there were 278. In June last year a total of 321 licenses were issued while in June 1918, there were but 272.

Another interesting fact in connection with the records of marriage licenses issued during August this year is that of the 321 issued, 172 were for Illinois couples and 138 for Wisconsin. The other 16 came from other states. Wisconsin for several years has been sending more marriage-seeking couples to Waukegan than Illinois. It looks as if the tables are turned at last.

Of the 172 Illinois licenses 58 were for couples in Lake County. This in itself is quite a record. Of the remaining Illinois couples at least half and probably more, came from Chicago.
