### THE TRAVELING CONGRESSMEN

The group of congressmen who went to the Philippines and other places in the far East are gradually drifting homeward. Naturally they bring back conflicting opinions concerning the Philippines, and Congressman Randall has achieved fame by fairly railing against independence for the islands. He is just as certain that they are incapable of self-government as Washington was indifferent in the early days, about leaving Oregon out of the Union. It was with tremendous difficulty that the legislators were put wise to what they were overlooking.

And then Cuba, according to reactionary Congressmen, was incapable of self-government. But with the right moral support of Uncle Sam the island has progressed rapidly — and grown rich at the same time. There was Porto Rico, too, which has demonstrated that it can manage its own affairs. Likewise we have our poor little rich possession known as Alaska, which has turned its cornucopia of wealth into the lap of the United States for years — and we have taken all from her — and given little in return.

Congressman Randall was among the earliest arrivals home, and he stole the thunder of the rest of the party by getting to the newspapers first. He has a notion, quite common among America's great, 'near great and not great at all, that the people of the United States has a cinch on knowledge concerning government, and that other races, like the Philippines will founder into wreck and ruin if left to their own resources. But the truth will disembark as the later boats come in; and it may be confidently expected that the Philippines will have the ear of the next session of Congress. Apparently no political group in the United States is opposed to Philippine independence. Every investigator admits that the Philippines have introduced the very best of educational methods and institutions into their country. In addition thousands of young men and women from the Islands have received their education in the United States. They almost always show that they are an alert, progressive and intellectual race, and every one of them is a living illustration of the validity of the claims of their people for self-government.

### NATIONAL DAIRY SHOW CHICAGO, OCTOBER 7-16

#### Big Exhibition of Farm Products and Cattle at Union Stock Yards

Not only farmers, dairymen and manufacturers of milk products, but the public at large is looking forward to the National Dairy show at the Union Stock yards, Chicago, Oct. 7-16, for the big exhibition is recognized as the greatest annual agricultural and industrial exposition in America. The show, with its immense herds of the finest breeds of dairy cattle and its monster display of machinery for farm, home dairy, milk plant, creamery, ice cream and cheese factories, will be made interesting to the casual visitor by its athletic carnival and its horse show.

Leading athletes of the Olympic team which won the Antwerp games will appear on the evenings of Oct. 7-8 and 9 in connection with the high school and college athletic contests. This will be the first appearance of the great track and field stars in America since the winning of the seventh Olympiad in brilliant fashion.

On the evening of Oct. 11 and thereafter until the close of the dairy show, the finest show horses in America will be exhibited in a dazzling horse show, which will outrival the society events at Minneola, Meadowbrook, Piping Rock and the South Shore Country club's horse meet. Announcement is made that the five great dairy breeds will be judged on the following days: Guernsey Day, Oct. 11; Holstein Day, Oct. 12; Brown Swiss Day, Oct. 12; Jersey Day, Oct. 13; and Ayrshire Day, Oct. 14.

Every state and national cattle association will have headquarters at the show and state leaders, county agents and club workers will have meeting places assigned them. The Dairy Products contest is set for October 8 and the Students' Cattle contest for October 9; Junior Cattle contest, Oct. 8.  
Exhibits of foreign products arranged under direction of their respective governments will be a distinctly interesting feature. More than 25 nations will be represented by delegations and exhibits. Denmark, Holland, Uruguay and Argentine will lead the others in the size of their butter and cheese exhibits.
