SELLING LAST COPIES OF HALSEY'S HISTORY

Nine Hundred Page Volume Containing County Happenings on Sale Now

The remaining twenty-five copies of the "History of Lake County," a nine-hundred page book compiled by the late John J. Halsey, L.L.D., for many years head of the department of political science at Lake Forest college, have been put on sale by the author's widow, Mrs. Halsey, of Lake Forest.

This history of the county is a book that should be in every private library in Lake county. In its fifty-six chapters are contained a complete history of the happenings in this vicinity ever since the days when the land was occupied by the Indians, and it describes in detail the activities of prominent persons and families. It also gives a geographical sketch, and describes the flora of Lake county. The churches and other institutions are taken up separately and discussed. An individual history of each township is given.

The "History of Lake County" originally sold for fifteen dollars a copy. Mrs. Halsey is selling the last twenty-five copies for five dollars each. They will be on sale at the Highland Park Press office.

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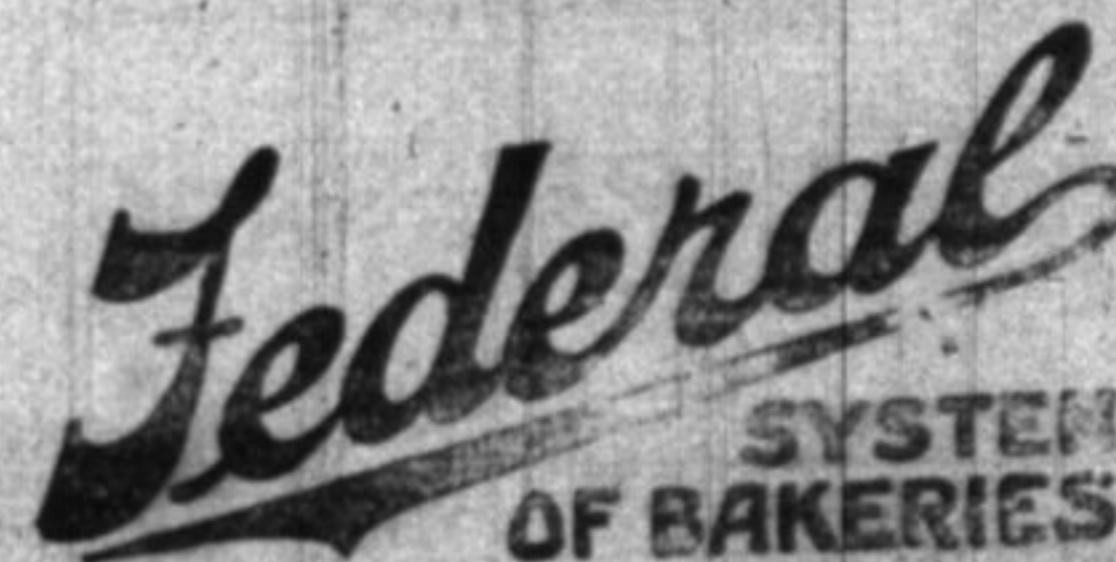
