The design for the building will be selected from competitive drawings submitted by the leading architects of the country. The committee on design is composed of Charles Dana Gibson, Edwin Howland Blashfield, Benjamin Morris and Henry Bacon. The latter designed the Lincoln Memorial at Washington.

WOOD TAKES COMMAND OF FORT OCTOBER 1

MOVE SIXTH HEADQUARTERS

Construction Work on the New Offices Will be Started Early Next Month

October 1 General Leonard Wood will assume command of Fort Sheridan, and October 15 he will move his Sixth corps headquarters there, according to arrangements made with the War Department.

According to Lieut. Gordon Johnston, chief of staff for intelligence, no definite information is available at this time regarding the question of a post commander. Whether or not the post will be commanded by a junior officer under the direct command of Major General Wood or whether the staff of the Sixth corps headquarters will likewise function as staff officers of Fort Sheridan, has not, as yet, been decided.

Removal October 15

Lieutenant Colonel Johnston said, in part: "On October 1 construction work on the new Sixth Corps headquarters at Fort Sheridan will be started. Considerable work will have to be done in effecting the transfer of the Corps headquarters, but it is expected that all things will be in readiness for the removal, scheduled for October 15."

Major General Wood, recently appointed commander of the Sixth Corps area, is at present maintaining temporary headquarters in Chicago, at 230 East Ohio street.

COUNTY INHERITANCE TAX TOTALS \$28,473

Lake County Estates Bring Big Receipts, Treasurer's Report Shows

Lake county received a total of \$28,473.79 for the year, the annual report of County Treasurer Roy W. Bracher shows, the report being presented to the board of review this week.

The largest inheritance tax was paid by the Robert J. Dady estate, being \$9,781.37.

The total amount paid during the fiscal year is \$28,473.79.

Disbursements for appraisers in these estates amounted to \$2,794.69, while the fees of the county clerk and treasurer were \$80 and \$569.42, respectively. The treasurer paid to the state the balance of the inheritance tax receipts totalling \$25,029.58.

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NATIONAL MEMORIAL TO OFFICERS PLANNED IN FORM OF A CLUB HOUSE

Where Officers of the Past, Present and Future Will Find a Home When in New York City

America's first national memorial to the officers who died in the war is to be in the form of a clubhouse in New York City where living officers of the past, present and the future may find a home when in that city. The Army and Navy Club of America of which Admiral Bradley A. Fiske is president is back of the movement.

As a preliminary step toward the realization of the plan, the club has compiled a complete list of the military leaders who made the supreme sacrifice. The official casualty report of the American Expeditionary Force formed the nucleus of this list, but hundreds of names have been added.

Through correspondence with governors and adjutant generals in each state, clubs, lodges, business concerns and next-of-kin, Admiral Fiske has been able to compile what is believed to be the most authentic list of officers dead on record.

As it is the aim of the organization to commemorate the officers individually, the club has secured the civil and military records of each with other interesting data, including copies of citations, general orders, photographs and memorial books, which will be preserved for all time in the archives of the new clubhouse.

The main feature of the building will be the memorial court or hall where the names of the dead will be engraved in bronze. While the building will stand as an enduring monument to the heroic dead, the club, believing that those who have "gone on", would prefer it, has determined that the memorial can best serve the interests of the nation by its usefulness as a home for officers and as a rallying center for all forms of patriotic activity.

The building will therefore contain in addition to the inspiring memorial court, comfortable quarters for living officers who come to New York. The total inadequacy of the present building at 18 Gramercy Park demonstrated during the war the necessity of a club-house for officers.
