## LOST GAME BY 7-5 AT WAUKEGAN SUNDAY

### LOCALS RALLY TOO LATE

#### Second Pitcher Was Put in After Opponents Get Several Runs; "Ump's" Decision Roils Some

Waukegan defeated Highland Park in the first game of the series last Sunday by a score of 7 to 5. A large crowd of fans witnessed the game, the entire north end of the grandstand being filled with Highland Park rooters.

Williams started the game, and for the first two innings looked like the best in the world, striking out five men. In the third, however, Overlock hit a lucky triple to right field after the first man had walked. Then Flynn singled, giving them two runs. In the fourth the explosion came when the first four men singled, scoring twice more.

Williams was replaced by Windleborn, who got the next two. Then Waukegan tried a double steal. Bachant, the Highland Park catcher, made a perfect throw to third, apparently getting the runner by five feet, but Moore, the field umpire, called him safe. Even the Waukegan rooters admitted this to be an unfair decision. George Olin, at third, was rolled at the decision, and shook the umpire, who ordered him off the field. This caused Highland Park to lose the team's best hitter.

The locals rallied twice after the fourth, making two runs in the seventh on clean hitting, and two more in the ninth on a single by Bachant and a homer by Mathey. Windleborn, who finished the game, will pitch next Sunday, and if he continues in last Sunday's form the team will come home with the game in the old bat bag providing they get no more impossible decisions from the umpire.

## CONFESSES STEALING HERE; HELD AT FORT

### DESERTED THREE TIMES

#### Find Gun on Man Who Asked for Car Demonstration at Night. Admits Many Robberies

Jason G. Bloodworth, alias J. G. Brown, self-confessed perpetrator of almost any crime the authorities here have asked him about, and thrice since last February a deserter from as many branches of the government service, was turned over to Fort Sheridan officials Monday afternoon by the local police and is now lodged in the guard house awaiting court martial. Among other charges held against the man are those of forgery and impersonation of an officer of the United States army.

Bloodworth and his wife came to Highland Park a few days ago and secured a room at a local hotel. Then he began calling on the different garages, posing as a prospective customer, and having cars demonstrated to him. Wednesday night he called for a night demonstration. The salesman, suspicious of the supposed customer, deposited him at the police station, where he was searched and a revolver found. The suspect was lodged in the city jail. When accused of being implicated in the theft of the Cadillac car from the McPherson garage, he confessed that he was an accomplice in that deed.

Little credence was given to this confession, for the man proceeded to confess to many crimes. He seemed to take a secret pride in the number of robberies he claimed to be guilty of.

A three page type-written manuscript of the man's admissions was compiled Friday evening. Saturday morning he was again questioned, and he told the same story, exact in every detail. Either Bloodworth has a remarkable memory for details or he is a marvellous liar.

Local authorities were puzzled to know whether the man was such a dyed-in-the-wool automobile thief as he claimed to be, or whether he was mentally unbalanced.

## PUBLISH MEMORIAL TO FALLEN HEROES

### STORY OF SHERIDAN CAMPS

#### History Contains Pictures and Write-ups of 250 Men from Fort Sheridan Who Fell During War

The Fort Sheridan association has published as a memorial to the fallen of the first and second training camps an illustrated history of that school of arms; a biographical roster of its dead and an account of the purposes and achievements of the association itself. The memorial contains a detailed record and survey of the training days, making it a sort of printed camp fire with its many reminiscences; and it has a martial introduction by Gen. James A. Ryan, in which he praises the "minute men of the Great War," and pleads with its survivors to "spread the gospel of preparedness."

"Almost two precious years were allowed to pass with the whole world aflame," Gen. Ryan says, "yet no attempt was made to prepare for the conflict that we had to enter to save civilization."

Tells of Fallen Heroes  
Those who pass through Fort Sheridan these days may look at the long streets and desolate wooden barracks, and think of the men who went out from there and did not come back. There were 270 of them, and the history contains a photograph and a concise biography of each of them, with the date, the place, and the circumstances of his going "West."

There are also lists of the candidates and scores of graphic pictures illustrating minor incidents of camp life, and some of the more important events of the two camps.

Waldo M. Allen of the 1st battery of the first camp wrote the story of that school, and Myron E. Adams is the historian of the second. Fred Girton is the compiler.

\$50,000 in Benefactions  
The benefactions of the association are recounted, and they make grateful reading for the patriot. "Friendship and necessity" were the parents of the organization, which still exists. During the last year \$50,000 has been advanced to men and their families in all sections of the country.

## DECREASE IN PRICE SPEEDS FORD SALES

### More Buy Fivvers Since Reduction; First Carload Since December Arrives

The thirty-one per cent decrease in the price of "fivvers" has increased the sale of those cars about 50 per cent during the past week. The substantial reduction in price has put them within the reach of many who previously hesitated to make the purchase. Ten Fords were sold during the week by the McPherson agency.

Last week the first carload of Ford cars to be shipped here by rail since last December arrived in Highland Park. Previously they were driven from Chicago, Detroit or Indianapolis.

## RUNYARD FILES PETITION FOR RECOUNT OF VOTES

### He Charges Hundreds of Votes Were Counted Illegally for Opponent

Attorney Eugene Runyard of Waukegan, defeated candidate for the Republican nomination for state senator, at the recent primary election, has filed a petition in circuit court, asking for a recount of the vote in a majority of the precincts in the three counties, Lake, Boone and McHenry, comprising this, the eighth senatorial district. The official canvass established that Mr. Runyard had been defeated by 124 votes.

In his petition filed Wednesday, Mr. Runyard asks for a re-count of the total vote cast in Boone and McHenry counties and also for the vote cast in the following Lake county precincts: Antioch, 1 and 2; Libertyville, 1, 2 and 3; Newport, Warren, Shields, 1, 2 and 4; Avon, 1 and 2; Fremont, West Deerfield, which includes Highland Park. This includes all the precincts in which Senator Swift received a majority of the votes cast for senator.

The specific charges are: That many defective ballots were counted which should not have been counted for either candidate.

That in Boone and McHenry counties and also in Lake county precincts mentioned the judges neglected to count at least 500 ballots for Runyard but marked them defective.

That at least 300 ballots which contained distinguishing marks or were marked illegally with crosses in front of more candidates than were running for the office of state senator, were counted for Swift.

The petition was filed by Attorneys R. J. Dady, Cooke, Pope and Pope and George W. Field.
