**WORK RESUMED ON BELVIDERE PAVING**

**Volo Road Also Being Pushed; Government Gives Orders for Materials**

Work was resumed Monday on the Belvidere road paving job west of Waukegan, after an idleness of a month due to a shortage of paving materials. The Standard Paving company, which has the contract for paving this road, has received an order from the government for seven car loads of sand and gravel per day. This is ample to keep the men working full force until the job is completed.

Paschen Brothers, who have the contract for paving the Volo road have received a similar concession from the government. This means that both stretches of road should be completed before cold weather sets in this year. The Standard Paving company is resuming work at Grayslake and has about a mile more of paving to put in.

Paschen Brothers are working toward this stretch of road and have about three miles to complete. They are putting in the paving at the rate of about 400 to 500 feet per day, however, and this speedy work is producing unexpected results.

A few weeks ago the outlook was anything but encouraging, due to the fact that the contractors did not seem able to get sufficient paving material to keep their men at work. The entire aspect has now been changed.
