**RUNYARD'S DEMAND FOR RECOUNT IS REFUSED**  
Case Dismissed; Official Returns From Springfield Are Not Yet Announced

Just about all the county seat legal talent was on hand in circuit court Thursday afternoon, last week, to lend a hand in the legal battle which was to force a recount of the vote for senatorial candidates in the recent primary, hoping by some chance to wipe out the majority which makes Senator Swift, the republican nominee, and place on the ticket in his stead Attorney Runyard, who was defeated by the narrow margin of 124 votes.

Judge Welch of Rockford had been asked to hear the case. He was on hand and Mr. Runyard's brace of attorneys lost little time in presenting their opening argument.

They sought to base their conclusions on the "official returns" of course. Then it developed there are as yet no official returns, other than the canvass of the precinct vote in each county, the result of which was forwarded to the Secretary of State. That official has not announced the result.

Judge Welch could do nothing but dismiss the case, and so ended the first round of the legal battle which is intended to result in reversing the decision at the primary.

Probably there will be other rounds as those most interested in securing a recount of the vote seem to be attorneys, and that's their game.

Yet, if there is a recount, Senator Swift's majority over Runyard materially increasing is among the possibilities. But the Senator, himself a converted attorney, enjoys the melee and will go along with the lawyers as far as they like. Though the fun costs a bit he may be depended upon to get his money's worth, the while showing political mentors at the county seat a thing or two.

**NO OPPOSITION FOR REPUBLICAN TICKET**  
Absence of Democratic County Candidates Makes Election G. O. P. Certainty

The Republican nominees in Lake county will have the easiest time of their lives at the fall election on November 2.

The county offices to be filled this year, together with the Republican nominees are as follows:  
State's Attorney A. V. Smith.  
Circuit Clerk — L. O. Brockway.  
County Coroner — Dr. J. L. Taylor.  
Supt. of Highways — C. E. Russell.  
The Democrats did not see fit to put a county ticket into the field this year. At the primaries the only office which brought forth a contest on the Republican ticket was that of state's attorney. Under the state law it is necessary for an independent candidate to go on the ballot by a petition filed at least thirty days before the election.

Aside from the state and national ticket the county interest in the election will be confined to the legislative fight which promises to be one of the hottest in years. With Lake county represented by two candidates, a Republican and a Democrat, and with the other part of the district putting up two Republican candidates a strenuous fight is assured. Only three of the four candidates can be elected.

**ARRESTS MAY SOLVE PHONE BOX ROBBERIES**  
Believe Thieves Held in Chicago Operated Along the North Shore

The mystery connected with the breaking open of coin receptacles in public telephone booths in Highland Park and Waukegan several weeks ago, and the stealing of the locks at the same time, followed by the systematic robbery ever since of these receptacles by thieves who apparently were supplied with keys, may be solved as the result of the arrest in Chicago of two men who were taken into custody last week. They were discovered while attempting to pilfer a coin box in the State-Lake theatre, which had a burglar alarm.

The men taken into custody in Chicago gave their names as Harry J. Behrens, a hotel clerk, and Joseph Counselbaum, alias Harry Scherman, former prize-fighter.

In Behrens' room were found two revolvers and 1,000 coin wrappers. Both men had telephone box keys in their pockets. Eight weeks ago more than sixty telephone boxes were smashed in the loop, in Evanston, Highland Park, Waukegan, Lake Forest and Gary, and the locks taken. Later the boxes were opened regularly. Traces of the gang were also seen in Brooklyn, Minneapolis and other cities.
