essary to edify the public through the  
press and by public addresses what  
simple rules in fire prevention must  
be observed in order that our huge  
fire losses can be reduced to a mini-  
mum. In a community like Highland  
Park, and in fact every other com-  
munity throughout the land, be it  
large or small, much more could be  
accomplished along this line if a  
Board of Fire Prevention were estab-  
lished under the city administration  
similar to the Board of Health now ex-  
isting with the medical profession as  
its staff. In selecting members on this  
Board it would be advisable to con-  
sider the insurance men of the com-  
munity and other citizens interested  
in fire safety appliances. In this  
way considerable aid could be given to  
the Fire Marshal and Fire Commis-  
sioner in studying fire hazards in their  
innermost details and it would tend to  
awaken the public to a keener sense  
of responsibility.

**Local Firemen Efficient**  
In reviewing our local matters in  
fire prevention, the people of High-  
land Park and vicinity should give  
due praise toward our fire depart-  
ment. No greater responsibility has  
ever fallen on any one than on the  
shoulders of Fire Chief Edward Hos-  
kin and his gallant crew of eleven men  
all of whom are volunteers with the  
exception of two. It is a very simple  
matter to undervalue the services  
rendered by a fire department and  
many people regard it as a machine  
without any human instinct. These  
men are subject to call at all hours of  
the night when many of us are at  
home sleeping soundly. Little do we  
realize how often they slip away from  
their peaceful home, wife and child,  
into the bitter cold of the night to  
brave the dangers of fire only be-  
cause some ignoramus was perhaps  
careless about his furnace or stove.  
Is it not worthy of consideration and  
a compliment to the Highland Park  
Fire Department to have only a \$4000  
fire loss out of \$165,000 endangered  
property value during the year 1919.  
Do you know that out of 79 fire calls  
in 1919 the Fire Chief's record shows  
the following:

Grass fires	39
Furnaces	10
Hot Ashes	1

Automobile . . . . . 3  
Matches . . . . . 1  
Cigars and Cigarettes . . . . . 1

All other causes . . . . . 9  
79

Taking the first eight causes of fire  
as listed above, this shows that 83  
per cent of our local fires were pre-  
ventable. Doesn't this prove how im-  
portant the work of fire prevention  
should prevail in our community and  
what benefits could be derived from  
a Board of Fire Prevention?

Lastly, let us not forget our duty  
in this respect and not look upon fire  
like we do upon rain, to take it as it  
comes. Let us reduce the number of  
fire calls and promote a community  
spirit like that in a New England  
town which has the following written  
over their fire engine house: "May this  
fire engine be like all the old maids  
of our village — always ready but  
never called for."
