REGISTER OCT. 26 FOR THE ELECTION

POLLS OPEN TILL 9:00 P.M.

Confusion Arises Tuesday Over Revision of the Registers at Different Polling Places

Much confusion arose Tuesday over the matter of registration for the election Nov. 2. Few of the men voters and almost none of the women voters understood the process accompanying this registration. Some of the polls were late in opening, due to some misunderstanding, and the polls at the high school were not opened until after two o'clock in the afternoon.

According to the election law the third Tuesday preceding the election the polling places in each precinct must be open from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. On that day the register of voters must be gone over by the judges, and the names of all who have moved out of the precinct and of those deceased must be eliminated. Names of newcomers are included, as far as possible. The new register is made from the old register and the poll books.

A week preceding the election, Tuesday, Oct. 26, the polling places will be open from 8 a. m. to 9 p. m. to enable all who have not previously done so to register. New-comers in the precinct must register at their polls. All are urged to make a trip to the polling place, and make sure for the election Nov. 2.

Any voter who is not properly registered before the election, in order to vote, must go through the formality of being sworn in, and must submit to a lot of bothersome red tape. This is disagreeable for the voter and for the election officials. Register on Oct. 26, and be ready to vote on November 2.

COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION OCT. 22-23

AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

All Churches Unite to Entertain the Out-of-Town Guests. Prepare an Interesting Program

The fiftieth annual convention of the Lake County Sunday School association will be held in the Highland Park Presbyterian church on October 22nd and 23rd. All of the Highland Park churches are uniting to entertain the out-of-town delegates in right royal fashion. The officers of the association have been at work for months preparing the program, securing the speakers and perfecting plans to make this an occasion long to be remembered in the annals of Lake county Sunday school work. The best talent to be found in this part of the county has been secured.

The Rev. George Roberts, Jr., of Lake Forest will deliver the opening address of the convention on Friday morning, Oct. 22nd. The Friday afternoon session will be one of unusual interest. An Anniversary program has been prepared by Mrs. Francis D. Everett. Five of the delegates to the first convention which was held fifty years ago at Milburn will be on the platform. The semi-annual address will be delivered by Mr. W. C. Pearce, acting general secretary of the International Sunday School association. Mr. Pearce began his Sunday school career in Illinois and is well known to people of this section. He will have a powerful message.

The young people will also be featured on Friday afternoon and evening. Three young people will give five minute talks at the opening of the Friday afternoon session. Two of our Highland Park young women have been chosen to speak, Miss Virginia Purdy and Miss Dorothy Laing. At five o'clock there will be a social hour with games for young people and at the convention banquet which will be served at six o'clock special tables will be reserved for the young people. A program of songs, stunts and yells will be given by them. Mr. Pearce will again address the convention at the Friday evening session. Special music will be rendered by a community chorus under the direction of Herbert Moon. Miss Bertha Harbaugh will preside at the pipe organ throughout the convention and Mr. Frederick J. Cox, pastor of the Rosecrans M. E. church, will lead the congregational singing at all the sessions.

Saturday afternoon will be of especial interest to teachers and workers in the Sunday school. Simultaneous conferences covering every branch of Sunday school work will be held. The various subjects will be handled by experts. D. H. Wing, state superintendent of young people and adult division, Rev. S. A. McCollam, ex-state superintendent of Maryland and Mrs. W. H. Dietz, primary specialist of Chicago, constitute some of the talent which has been secured.

The closing address of the convention on Saturday afternoon will be delivered by the Rev. John Timothy Stone, D. D., pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian church of Chicago. All who know Dr. Stone or have heard of his work will want to hear his inspiring message.

Highland Park has extended its hospitality to the Lake County Sunday School association and in doing so gains the opportunity for enjoyment and uplift which is sure to come from such a convention. SUGGEST NEW PLAN TO SAVE RAILROAD

Directors Trying Hard to Save Palatine Railroad from Financial Ruin

Directors of the P., L. Z. & W. Ry. are trying to devise ways and means to "save the road." The most feasible plan proposed contemplates monthly payments by business men of Wauconda and Lake Zurich and farmers in the adjoining territory, who will be asked to subscribe \$40,000.

The plan is to divide this amount between the farmers and business men, each to raise \$20,000.

There are approximately 100,000 cans of milk brought to the Wauconda milk plant during the year. Ten cents a can on this milk would amount to \$10,000 a year and in two years \$20,000.

Farmers will be asked to allow 10 cents a can per month to be deducted from their milk shipments, and for each \$50 so deducted will be issued a first mortgage bond.

Business men will be asked to subscribe \$500 each to be paid at the rate of \$100 per year over a period of five years.

Only by such a financial plan can the railroad continue to operate.
