## SALVATION ARMY APPEALS FOR FUNDS

### Drive to Finance Charitable and Character Building Operations

A hundred Salvation Army advisory boards in as many counties launched a simultaneous appeal to the people of Illinois today to finance the charitable and character-building operations of that organization for another year.

Special committees formed in each county under the direction of the advisory board chairmen have arranged for the financial canvass. Speakers have been obtained to tell the story of how the Salvationists have made it true that "A man may be down, but he's never out."

From nearly every pulpit in Illinois, reference was made Sunday to the work for humanity of the Army of "Fire and Blood," and endorsement was given to the plea for financial support.

An outstanding feature of the Salvation Army's budget this year is an item of \$165,000 to open a Boys' and Girls' industrial home and farm. Of that amount, only \$33,000 is being raised in the state outside of Cook county. There is a second item of \$13,200 for a year's maintenance of the home.

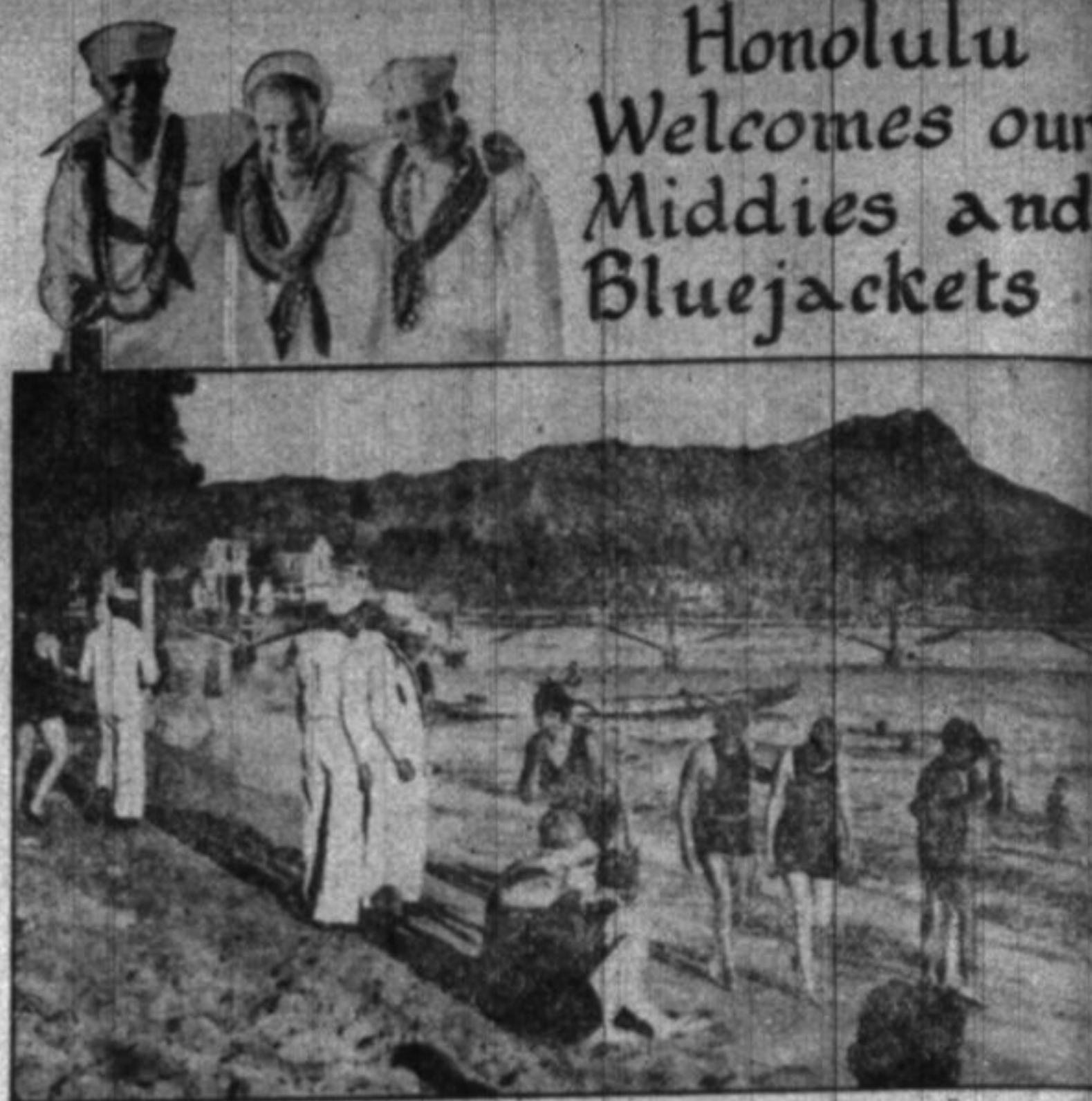
Advisory boards have discovered that there are thousands of homeless children in Illinois, and other thousands who have been reported to the juvenile authorities, but who have not been adjudged incorrigible enough to be sent to state institutions.

In California and other states, the Salvation Army has been successful for years in dealing with such cases, and the system employed has proved that a potential bad citizen, if taken in time, may be made into a useful member of society.

This new activity for Illinois has been endorsed strongly by the State Advisory board and numerous public officials who have seen the need of a constructive plan for salvaging those who might become a burden on the next generation.

It is proposed that the new home shall have a capacity at the outset for 200 children.

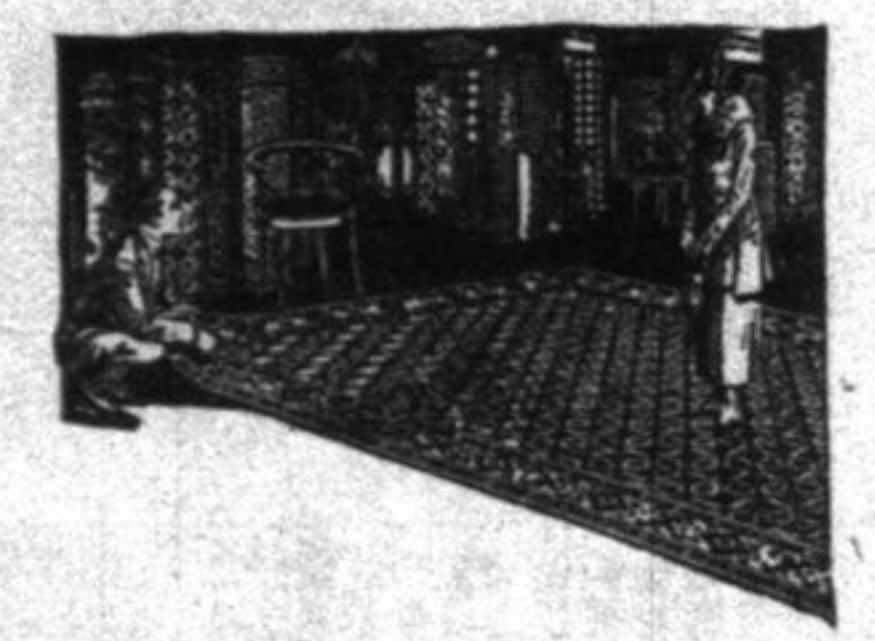
