## NINTH INNING DASH WINS FOR WAUKEGAN

LOCALS LOSE LAST GAME

Comeback in Last Frame Brings In Winning Run for Opponents; Conlon Pitched Tight Game

The third game of the Waukegan-Highland Park series, played last Sunday at Waukegan, resulted in the third defeat of the local nine. An overwhelming comeback in the ninth inning, staged by the Waukegan players, gave them the game. The final score was 3 to 2.

With Overlock and Conlon, two good friends, but deadly rivals in a ball game, pitted against each other, the game became a tight pitchers' battle from the onset. Both boys were accorded brilliant support in the field. Conlon's support flagged a little in the ninth, and allowed the winning tally to come in.

For five innings there was nothing doing in the scoring line for either side, although John Conlon passed up a big chance by being trapped off third in the fourth. While Olson was up Conlon wandered away of third and was an easy out on Overlock's toss to Flynn.

Waukegan never had a chance against the southpaw spitballer until Overlock blew open the sixth with a triple through Williams. Madigan fanned, and when Burke attempted a squeeze play, he popped a little fly to the box and a double play was narrowly averted. Tommy was an easy victim on a delayed steal.

This one-run margin looked like the ball game, the way the pitchers were going, and grew to considerable dignity as the Highland Park boys were retired in order in the seventh and eighth, but then came the ninth inning fireworks.

McKittrick fired the first gun with a single through short, but was quickly forced on Morrison's bounder to Cook. With two strikes on John Conlon, Overlock fed him a high ball, but John clouted it clear over Burke for three sacks, scoring Morrison with a tying run. The Highland Park rooters woke up with a bang, and made a lot of noise.

Then Waukegan came to bat, and Flynn knocked one of Conlon's spitballs out of the lot. He scored. Cook sent a timely double to left, enabling Mokate to bring in the winning tally for Waukegan.
