**CITY AND TOWN PLANNING, THE SUBDIVISION OF LAND**

One of the greatest mistakes that has been made in the growth of American towns, has been the failure to control properly the subdivision of land. Most communities have been cut up on a hit or miss, helter skelter plan, with results costly, inconvenient, and ugly.

In some towns you find the houses huddled closely together as a result of cutting up land in too small lots. And then in others, you find streets set so far apart that houses have more back yard than most of them need. These back yards shelter all kinds of disorder, and encourage a whole neighborhood to maintain property in a slatternly way.

Also when a town is cut up with streets too far apart, the result is that it costs a great deal more, as the place grows, to extend water and gas mains, light and telephone wires and sidewalks. The straggling town is a costly town to keep up.

Another mistake has been to allow real estate owners to develop tracts just as they saw fit. In this way many towns have grown up with criss-cross streets. No two streets would fit into the other. If you went east and west for a block, then you had to travel some distance on a north and south street to find another running east and west. As a result people who have to cross such a town must make a succession of zig-zags.

Many land owners cut up their tracts into such tiny lots that good houses will never be erected on them, and householders can not have any gardens or be encouraged to beautify their holdings.

How far public authority can interfere with the cutting up of land belonging to private owners, is of course a question. But land owners should see that it is for their interest to cooperate with a community plan for developing a well arranged growth.

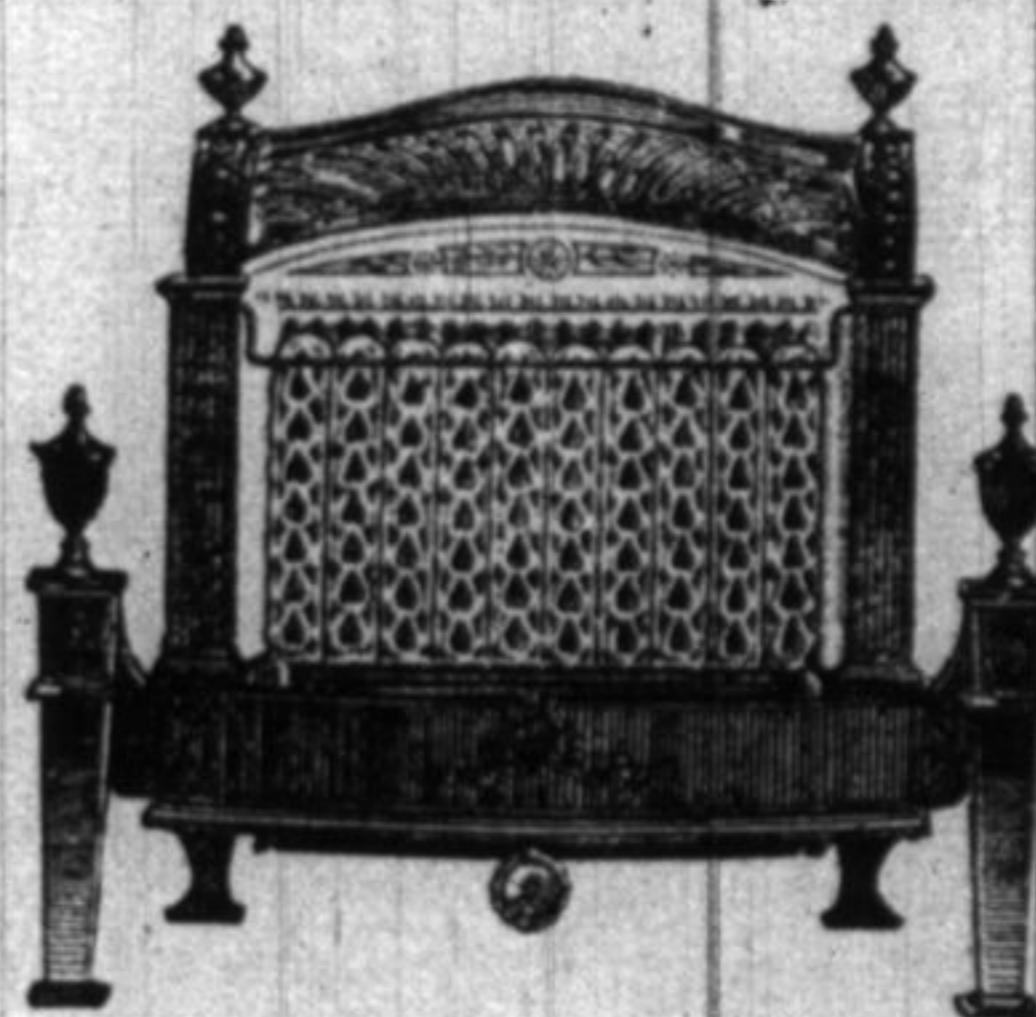
