Kids who raid their neighbors' orchards should leave a little fruit behind, because if they don't the owner won't be encouraged to grow any next year.

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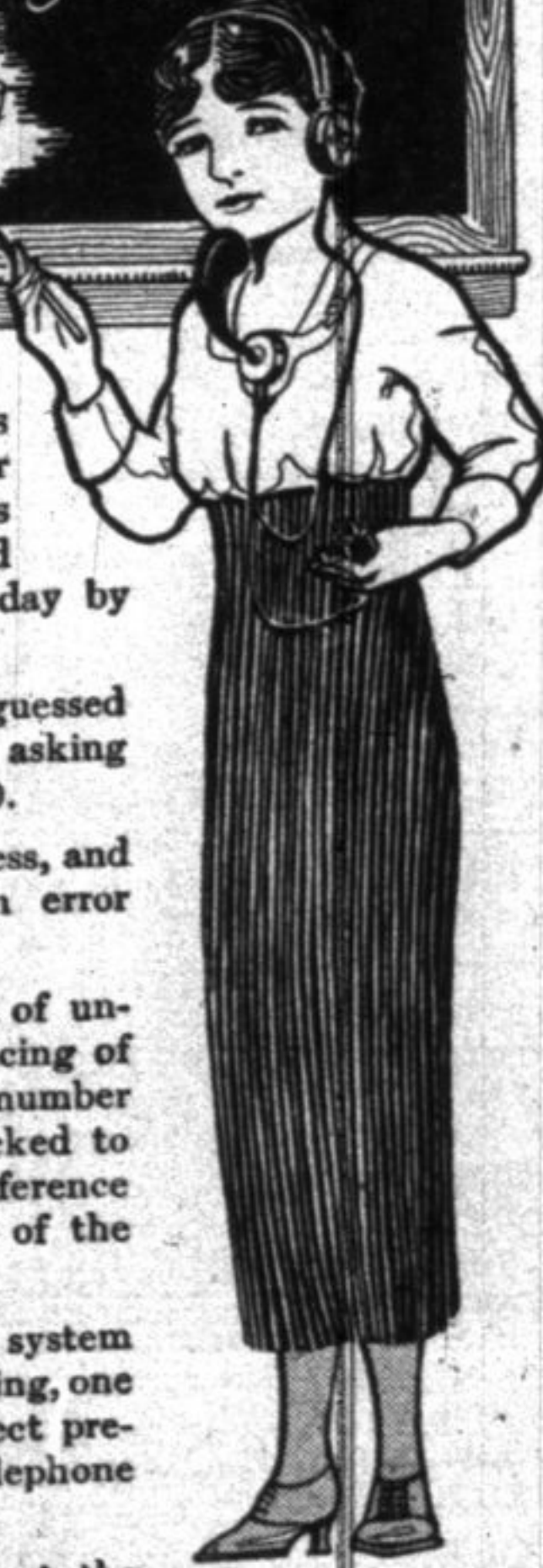

It is easy to be wrong when you guess, and unfortunately the person called in error generally blames the service.

Next to guessing as a fruitful source of unsatisfactory telephone service is placing of undue faith in the correctness of the number on an old card, letterhead or list tacked to the wall. Use instead the Ready Reference Register on the inside front cover of the directory.

But better still, in a big telephone system where numbers are constantly changing, one should always make sure of the correct prefix and number by consulting the telephone directory before calling.

**SWIFT'S NAME WILL
APPEAR ON BALLOT**

**Judge R. K. Welsh Dismisses
Runyard Petition Asking
For a Recount**

Senator Rodney B. Swift of Libertyville, won a signal victory in Circuit Court Monday when Judge R. K. Welsh dismissed the recount petition filed by Attorney E. M. Runyard of Waukegan and ordered the name of Mr. Swift placed on the election ballot. The summary action of the court in thus disposing of the case was the only thing which made it possible for the name of either candidate to be certified on the ballot by the secretary of state.

Judge Welsh dismissed the first petition for recount filed by Mr. Runyard on the grounds that it was filed prematurely — that it should not have been filed until the state election board had canvassed the result of the primary and submitted a report.

The second petition was dismissed on the grounds that it was filed too soon after the election so that a decision could have been reached and a recount had, if necessary, before the secretary of state certified the names of the successful candidates. Judge Welsh held with Attorney Orvis and Joslyn for Senator Swift that no matter what the decision might be in a case of recount it could not benefit Mr. Runyard for his name could not go on the ballot, and on the other hand the delay would work a real hardship on Senator Swift because it would have a tendency to keep his name off the ballot also.

Immediately after the decision by Judge Welsh a telegram was sent to Springfield by the circuit clerk, showing the disposition made of the case and asking that Senator Swift's name be certified on the ballot.

It is expected that this course will be taken.

**Eleven Distinct Parties Represented on Ticket This Fall.
Co. Clerk Has List**

County Clerk Lew A. Hencoe has received from Louis L. Emmerson, secretary of state, the certified list of candidates to be voted upon at the election Nov. 2.

The ballots this year will be the largest that have been required in the state for a number of years, if not ever, as there are eleven parties having candidates. The Republican, Democratic, Socialist, Prohibition and Farmer-Labor parties, have completed tickets to be voted upon, as does the single tax party with the exception of the two representatives in Congress. The Socialist Labor party has a complete ticket with the exception of six electors of president and vice-president.
