REALTORS VOTE TO STOP SUNDAY BUSINESS

North Shore Board Met Last Week and Voted to Adopt Plan

At the October meeting of the North Shore Real Estate board held this past week the resolution to stop Sunday business was adopted by a unanimous vote. This deviation from the time-worn custom of the broker putting his personal affairs secondary to the wishes of his clients by giving up Sunday, the only day he may have to rest, to be of service to them we hope has passed with the adoption of this splendid chance. Sunday closing will go into effect all along the North Shore among the members of the Board from Evanston to Lake Forest November 1st. Those vitally interested in the success of

this new movement believe that the people who are desirous of making the North Shore their home will assist them by making it a point to come to the North Shore suburbs during the week days to look for property, rather than to come Sundays when the proper attention cannot necessarily be given them on account of the Sunday afternoon rush to agents as has heretofore been the case.

This action by the representative voters along the North Shore is merely an extension of what is already a custom with Evanston and Wilmette agents. The offices in Wilmette have been closed for more than a year now and as one broker expresses himself "rather than take my Sundays away from me now I'd sell out and quit the business."

MANY DEFENDANTS IN \$10,000 DAMAGE SUIT

Highwood Woman Names Several Prominent Citizens in New Attack

A fresh attack in the seven years war was begun Friday in the circuit court at Waukegan when Miss Jean Stroble, of Highwood, through her attorney, E. V. Orvis, filed the Praecipe in a \$10,000 action for damages naming many prominent Highwood and Highland Park persons as defendants, John Meyers, Highwood mayor, being one.

Not until the declaration is filed will the exact charges be known but from the line-up of defendants, George Reno Jones, Mrs. George Reno Jones, John Reno Jones, Mrs. Jennie Miller and Ruth Ewing, all of Highland Park, the latter being secretary of the Illinois Humane Society, the charges will center around the removal of Miss Stroble from her Highwood home to Lake County general hospital by alleged force, and that during her stay there her trunks and other effects looted and furniture removed.

Miss Stroble is a sufferer from asthma and it was because of this ailment she was removed to the hospital against her will she claims.

The plaintiff is a familiar figure in Lake County court circles, and for five or six years she fought the Ravinia company to prevent them from giving up her squatter's claim and chickens upon the property which is now Ravinia opera grounds. Miss Stroble made her living by raising chickens and the crowing of the chantiers, it was claimed, interfered with the warbling of the opera stars.

In the first action Miss Stroble was victorious over the Ravinia company in a forcible detainer suit, Lake county court, but in the second the appellate court found in favor of the plaintiffs.

The other Highwood defendants in the \$10,000 suit are Annie Campbell, Charles Whiting and Jessie Wright.
