JUDGE WM. EWING'S BROTHER PASSES AWAY

HAD MANY FRIENDS HERE

Hon. Adlai T. Ewing, Well-Known Lawyer, Died at His Home in Chicago Tuesday

Hon. Adlai T. Ewing, well-known lawyer, died November 2nd at his home, 3745 Ellis avenue, Chicago. Mr. Ewing was descended from Scotch-Irish ancestors. His father and mother were natives of North Carolina, removing to Kentucky and later to Illinois, where Adlai Thomas was born on February 5th, 1846. His father was a man of marked individuality and force of character—and a warm personal friend of Abraham Lincoln. His mother was the grandniece of Dr. Ephriam Brevard, the author of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence.

He was educated at the Illinois State Normal University, studied law in Bloomington and was admitted to the bar in 1868. In 1882 he formed a partnership with his brother, Hon. William G. Ewing in Chicago, where they occupied leading positions at the bar for many years, until the brother's election to the bench dissolved the partnership. For several years past Mr. Ewing has been retired from active practice, but engaged in a business enterprise in Hobart, Indiana.

The late Hon. Adlai Ewing Stevenson, Vice-President of the United States from 1892-96 was a cousin, and the late Hon. James S. Ewing, former Minister to Belgium, his elder brother. Judge William G. Ewing of Highland Park, and Hon. Henry A. Ewing of Kansas survive him. The Stevenson-Ewing family has been widely known for its patriotism and public spirit, and has furnished as many distinguished lawyers to the county, state and national courts as any one family in the county.

Mr. Ewing was an active advocate of the Democratic party from early manhood, although he never sought political office. He was a charter member of the Iroquois Club, serving continuously for years as its secretary, vice-president and president. He was one of the foremost promoters of the great sanitary, and commercial enterprise commonly known (Continued on Page 5)

BLOODWORTH ESCAPES FROM FORT SHERIDAN

FLEES FROM ARMED GUARD FIRST DEFEAT OF SEASON

Deserter, Arrested in Highland Park September 27, Makes Get-Away Sunday Morning

Jason Bloodworth, alias Jack G. Brown, who was arrested in Highland Park a month ago, and later turned over to the Fort Sheridan authorities, escaped from a prison guard Sunday morning while on his way to the other end of the reservation.

Bloodworth was working in the stables under guard. Waiting for an opportune moment when the guard was not looking, he fled, and hid in the weeds in the field between Fort Sheridan and Highwood.

A thorough search for the fugitive was instituted, but the latter escaped, leaving behind his prison uniform. He evidently had outside assistance. Every passing train on the Chicago & Northwestern railway and the North Shore line was searched by soldiers, but Bloodworth had made his get-away.

Bloodworth was working in the Highland Park police Sept. 22, and was suspected in being implicated in the theft of an automobile from the McPherson garage. He confessed being guilty of every crime of which he was accused. Later it was found that he was wanted by military authorities, having thrice deserted from the service, and also being charged with forgery. The man was taken to the Fort Sheridan prison where he was awaiting court martial at the time of his escape. So far he has not been apprehended.

HIGHLAND PARK INCLUDED IN BIG REPUBLICAN LANDSLIDE

SCRATCHED BALLOTS FAIL TO SAVE THE DEMOCRATS

Republicans Lead Everywhere in City and County. Weiss, Francis, and Pierce Reported Elected to Legislature. Men Best Women in Voting Straight Ticket

Highland Park and Lake County followed the rest of the state and nation in the big Republican landslide that occurred in the election Tuesday. Republican candidates for every office carried big majorities in almost every precinct in the county.

Despite the campaign talk against Small as a Thompson machine candidate, he carried every precinct in Deerfield township except the Fourth and Fifth. In the Fourth an election freak occurred, Lewis receiving 170 women's votes and 144 men's votes, against 7 women's and 106 men's for Small. Everywhere else in this township Small and the rest of the Republican candidates were victorious.

More women than men "scratched" their ballots. In the Fourth precinct one woman carried this to the extreme. She emerged from the booth, after spending ten minutes over the ballot, and had placed a mark in every circle and every square on the entire sheet.

Despite the cold and threatening weather one of the biggest votes ever recorded was polled. In the Sixth precinct, for instance, where the registration was 432, 403 votes were cast Tuesday.

A few Farmer-Labor, a few socialist, and about ten straight Prohibition ballots were cast in Highland Park. The women's committee of the Harding-Coolidge club were on the job early and late. A representative was stationed at each polling place to keep a record of all women who had voted. Late in the afternoon all women who had registered, but who had not voted were called upon by members of the committee. In the Fourth precinct, the women's vote was more than the men's, as was also the case in the Fifth precinct.

Clerks in the eight polling places had a harder task than ever before in checking up the ballots, which Tuesday were larger and more complicated than in any previous election. In many of the precincts the officials worked until morning tallying and checking names and figures.

The two propositions drew a very large vote, but many people not being prepared did not vote on either question.

The Revision of Banking laws was carried by a very large majority, but the Sanitarium, while winning very heavy locally seems to be defeated, by the great opposition of the northern part of the district.

The four cornered fight for state representative resulted in Graham being defeated as all three Republican candidates were elected by the avalanche of straight tickets.
