The Needlework guild is no longer a part of the Chicago branch of the Needlework guild. They have organized a chapter of their own and following are the officers:

Articles will be distributed to institutions of Highland Park, namely: the Highland Park hospital, Presbyterian home and the visiting nurse association.

The Needlework guild is an international society, having branches in England, Scotland, Ireland, France, Italy, Belgium, Holland, Australia, Switzerland, Canada, and the United States. It was organized in England in 1882, by Lady Wolverton. The American society, the daughter of the English society, was founded in 1884, by Mrs. John Wood Stewart and is called the Needlework Guild of America, with offices at the Franklin Building, Philadelphia. It has 430 branches in the United States.

The object of the guild is to furnish new, plain, suitable garments to meet the needs of hospitals and other charities. The organization is non-sectarian and its membership consists of persons who agree to contribute two new garments or articles of household linen annually. Men, women and children may be members.

Once each year these garments are collected in one place and the public is invited to inspect them. They are then distributed to the various charitable institutions of the city.
