DECLINE IN PRICES AFFECTS RAILROADS

President Finley Optimistic Over Present Outlook; Sounder Conditions Will Follow

"While railroad earnings are somewhat mixed and there is a drop in traffic, I am not one who believes that anything but good will come out of it, because I think it is all working out as part of a readjustment plan for lower prices of everything and sounder conditions will follow."

This statement was made by William H. Finley, president of the Chicago & Northwestern, in discussing the railway situation in relation to September earnings. Continuing, he said:

"Of course, the drop hits us at a time when we were just getting our bearings and lining up to take care of needed improvements. A recession in business now strikes railroads harder than other industries because the roads did not accumulate surplus during the war. But I feel that when the economic conditions of the country are readjusted to the lower level of prices and labor efficiency reaches pre-war times, the railroads will be all the better for it. The carriers are rapidly getting their bearings and labor is increasing in efficiency until now men in all branches are imbued with ambition to give the public the best service and make their roads leaders. This ambition is what we have been working for, because it spells success. If the personal ambition element is present in railroad employes it will bridge a lot of difficulties."

LAKE COUNTY BULL BREAKS DIXON BANK

Invest in \$100,000 Animal and Fail to Meet Liabilities

Because the bull in question and the farm in question referred to below are located just east of Volo and in Lake County, Lake county folks will read with interest the following news item from Rockford, which tells about the fatal experience of men who paid a big price for a supposedly record-breaking bull and then made a mess of their job.

"Down Dixon way they are telling the story of how a bull bankrupted two men and broke the Dixon Union State bank.

"Red Apple Thorndyke VIII, the bull, was offered for \$100,000, Elmer J. Countryman, the cashier of the bank, and Edwin Depeweiler, a farmer, formed a partnership. They paid \$50,000 on the purchase price.

"The female progeny of Red Apple, the bull dispensers told the syndicate, would be record milk producers. One cow, daughter of Red, was given a test. Her milk was about 200 above par, but it is alleged that someone poured a cup or two of cream into the pail after milking time.

"Red came to be in great demand, but his daughters were so lousy. Returns on the investment were not enough to pay interest charges, so the partners went into bankruptcy.

"Countryman's liabilities are \$293,710, his assets \$198,863. Depeweiler's liabilities are \$198,863, his assets \$81,483. Enumerated among the assets for the two is a claim for \$50,000 against the former owners of the bull.

"The population of Dixon was startled this morning when a 'Closed' sign was hung over the Union State bank. A state examiner will be asked to go over the accounts. Depositors will get their money."

ORDER VACCINATION IN WAUKEGAN SCHOOLS

State and City Authorities Join in Efforts to Check Epidemic

Stamping out of smallpox, prevalent in Waukegan at this time, by the enforced vaccination of all pupils, teachers or persons connected with public, private or parochial schools in this city was begun following a conference between City Physician J. C. Foley, Dr. S. S. Wimler, inspector for the state board of health, and Chief of Police Peter McDermott, commissioner of public health and safety.

A resolution passed last week decrees that: "on and after next Monday no child, teacher or other person employed in or about a school building shall be admitted, received or retained in any public, private or parochial school in the city nor shall be admitted to attend school, who cannot produce a certificate from a legally licensed physician in the state of Illinois, that he or she has had smallpox or that he or she has been successfully vaccinated within the last five years."

SEND FOR YOUR VICTORY MEDALS AND CLASPS

Navy Recruiting Station, 619 So. State St., Chicago, Illinois, will issue Victory Medals and Clasps to all ex-regular Navy men, Naval Reserves who have been discharged and who have not re-enrolled and to officers who may have resigned and are not now connected with Naval Service. Issue will be made to men residing in this recruiting district only, embracing the following territory: State of Illinois, north of line formed by southern boundary of Mercer, Henry, Stark, Marshall, La Salle, Grundy and Kankakee counties. All others not residing in the above named counties will apply to Navy Recruiting station located in the district in which they reside.

No application will be necessary to secure Victory Medal or clasp. Simply forward your original discharge and War Service Certificate to this station and the same will be returned to you after notation has been made on your discharge, together with Victory Medal and Clasp and button if you have not already received the latter. Certified copies of discharges or War Service Certificate will not be accepted.

Naval Reserves on inactive duty will be issued Medals and Clasps by the Commandants of the Naval Districts in which the Reserves reside. No requests should be addressed to Commandants until directed to do so by the Commandants concerned.

In submitting requests for Medals, all concerned are requested to give full name, address in full, i. e. R. F. D. and box if any so as to insure delivery of Medals. Those desiring to have their discharges and War Service Certificates returned by registered mail, should enclose \$1.10 stamp to cover cost of registration.
