The Supreme Court of the United States has refused to review a suit brought against the Secretary of State to bring to an end the technical state of war with Germany.

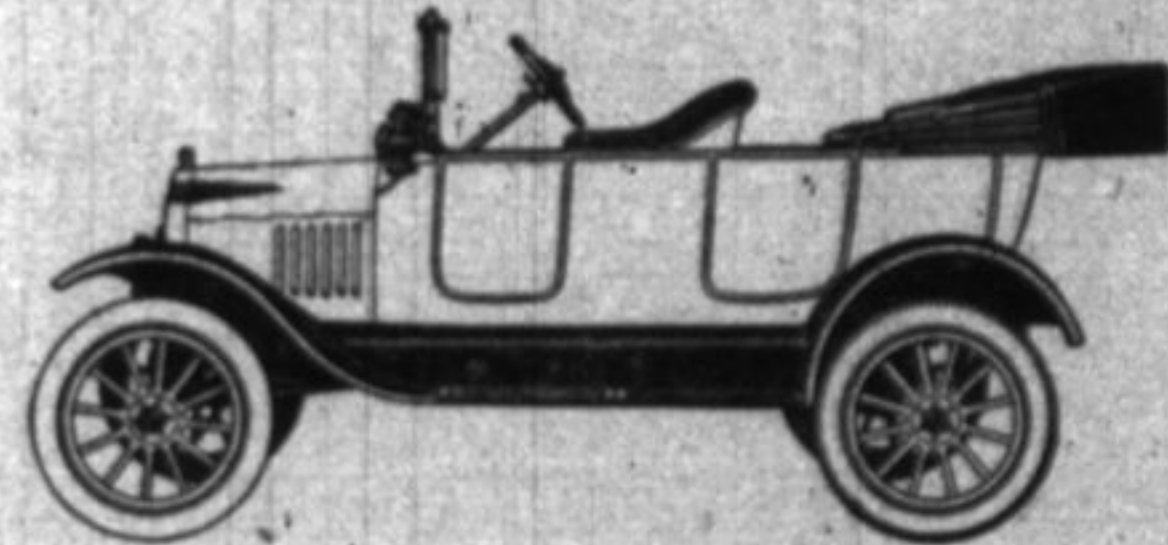
**MOONSHINE STAMPS**
